SECTION I

A DIGEST OF THE COMMISSION'S ACTIVITIES

Introduction

The varied fields of work and responsibilities of the Public Service Commission result in the issuance each year of a multiplicity of orders dealing with rates, service, operating authority, grade crossings, and other matters concerned with the public utilities under the Commission's jurisdiction. Aside from proceedings in which formal written findings and orders are prepared and released the Commission and its staff handle many matters on an informal basis such as complaints from customers of the utilities. A large majority of such complaints are settled to the satisfaction of the complaining parties.

There is presented below a brief summary of the major activities of the Commission during the report period together with such comments as we deem appropriate. The tables in Section III include digests of the Commission's orders.

Electric Rates

The electric power and light rates of the six electric public utilities operating in Utah remained unchanged during the period of this report.

Natural Gas Rates

Following an extensive investigation and hearing an order of the Commission was issued on February 17, 1960, which authorized Mountain Fuel Supply Company to increase its rates for natural gas service in Utah by \$1,215,136 when applied to the volume of sales during the 12 months ended July 31, 1959. The new rates represent an over-all increase of 4.45 per cent over the superseded rates. This change in rates was authorized primarily to provide Mountain Fuel Supply Company with adequate funds for exploration purposes, to rehabilitate certain sections of the original transmission pipelines that were installed in 1929 which are in danger of ruptures or breaks, and to meet higher interest costs on current borrowings for construction purposes.

Telephone Rates and Service

The Midland Telephone Company was authorized to publish new rates for mobile telephone service in an order issued October 30, 1959. The evidence indicated that this service was being rendered at a loss and the new rates were designed to offset such loss.

An order dated June 24, 1960, granted permission to Emery County Farmers Union Telephone Association to make a new schedule of rates effective in its service area. This is a non-profit organization and the increased rates were fixed at a level sufficient to meet necessary expenses of operation, including interest on money borrowed from the United States Government through the Rural Electrification Administration.

In June 1960 the character of telephone service being rendered through the Magna exchange of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company was changed so as to provide toll-free service between customers in the Magna exchange, on the one hand, and customers in the Kearns and Salt Lake City zones of the Salt Lake City Metropolitan exchange on the other hand. This service was instituted to satisfy the telephone requirements of a large majority of the people in the Magna area. An expenditure of approximately \$400,000 was made by the company for new plant and facilities to provide such service. The Commission in an order dated September 18, 1959, authorized the company to apply the same rates and charges to Magna customers, upon initiation of the new service, as are in effect in the other zones of the Salt Lake Metropolitan exchange for the same class or kind of service.

Railroad Rates Intrastate

The Commission disposed of six cases concerned with intrastate rail freight rates and classifications and one dealing with passenger fares, as shown in Table No. 4. Carrier applications in two of the proceedings were dismissed. In one of these, filed on June 11, 1956, approval was sought for higher intrastate freight rates commensurate with the increases granted by the Interstate Commerce Commission in Ex Parte 196, and in the other which was filed April 16, 1957, increases were requested comparable to those allowed by the ICC in Ex Parte 196 and 206. These two cases were dismissed following the action of the ICC in a Section 13 proceeding (Docket Nos. 31484 and 32253 consolidated record), wherein the railroads were ordered to apply intrastate in Utah the increases that had been allowed interstate by the ICC in these dockets. It was stated in our last report that hearings on this matter were held before the ICC in October 1958 and January 1959. The hearing examiner issued his report and proposed order on December 7, 1959, in which the Utah Commission was directed to put into effect the increases previously allowed in Ex Parte 175, 196, and 206. The cumulative effect of these increases would have been to raise Utah intrastate railroad freight rates approximately 38 per cent. Under date of December 31, 1959, the Utah Commission notified the ICC of its refusal to grant the increases. The ICC on March 17, 1960, ordered the higher level of rates to be made effective intrastate in Utah and pursuant to this order such rates became operative on May 13, 1960. The Utah Commission concluded not to oppose the action of the ICC any further, but the Utah Citizens Rate Association instituted a proceeding in the United States District Court to set aside the ICC order. The matter was pending in the Court on June 30, 1960.

Transcontinental Division Case

For several years the Interstate Commerce Commission has been taking evidence in what is known as the Transcontinental Divisions Case, Docket No. 31503 (Subs 1-5). Briefly, this involves an action by Eastern and Midwestern Railroads against the Mountain-Pacific Railroads for a higher division of revenue on transcontinental movements of freight over two or more railroads. During the report period

the matter was submitted for final determination in connection with which this Commission joined with seven other Mountain-Pacific states in a brief in support of the position of the Mountain-Pacific lines.

Express Rates Intrastate

Two cases were closed dealing with the rates of Railway Express Agency, Inc. One resulted in a general increase in rates and the other in both increases and reductions. These rate changes are a part of a substantial nationwide readjustment program by Railway Express Agency to restore its business to a competitive but reasonably compensatory level. These orders are briefed in Table No. 6.

Motor Carrier Rates Intrastate

The Commission disposed of 21 formal proceedings in which rate, rule, and classification changes of Utah motor carriers were involved. The orders in nine of these cases granted either wholly or partially the increased rates requested by freight and passenger carriers, while three such applications were denied completely, and one was dismissed. There were eight cases in which classification changes were approved that resulted in some technical increases and some decreases. Table No. 7 contains a summary of these orders.

Urban Passenger Carrier Rates and Service

An application of Salt Lake City Lines for increased fares for the transportation of passengers was denied under date of July 30, 1959. Certain other conditions were included in the same order, the details of which are shown in Table No. 5.

A petition of Salt Lake City Lines to reopen the case was granted on March 17, 1960, and a further hearing was held. The evidence submitted disclosed that the loss of riders which this carrier has been experiencing for several years is continuing, with no prospect for a reversal of the trend. The Commission found that the relief needed by Salt Lake City Lines could be afforded in one of two ways, either an increase in fares or a decrease in service. It was the conclusion of the Commission that the people being served by this carrier would prefer that no further curtailments be made in schedules or headways. Accordingly the Commission authorized certain fare changes among which the most important was the elimination of adult tokens which sold at two for 25 cents. Adult riders now pay a cash fare of 15 cents in lieu of the former token rate. Table No. 5 may be consulted for further details of the order.

Motor Carrier Operating Authority

Proceedings dealing with operating authority of common and contract motor carriers required a considerable part of the time and attention of the Commission. Tables 10 to 17 contain summaries of the action taken in this area. There is shown in the following tabulation a summary of the orders issued in which motor carrier rights were involved.

Special Permissions

There were 93 special permissions issued authorizing tariff changes and other actions on less than the statutory notice 30 days. Table No. 19 shows a summary of such orders.

Informal Dockets

Five informal dockets were concluded in each of which a transportation carrier was authorized to make a refund of an overcharge or waive collection of an undercharge. These orders are summarized in Table 20.

Special Orders

Certain groups of carriers and individual applicants submit frequent requests to the Commission for authority to make tariff changes. The Commission decided that the handling of these applications could be expedited by assigning one case number to a given party, and that thereafter any similar application would be given successive sub numbers. This was accomplished by a special order in the following cases:

Commission Finances

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, the Commission expended \$144,432.27 in the administration of the laws applicable to public utilities. This amount includes expenditures for personal services, travel, current expenses, and capital outlay, as well as the Commission's pro rata share of the central administration costs of the Department of Business Regulation. Additional details are contained in Table 22.

Review of Commission Orders by Supreme Court of Utah

Utah Freightways, Inc., v.

Public Service Commission of Utah and
Carbon Motorway, Inc.

(Supreme Court No. 9078)

Utah Freightways, Inc., was granted a certificate of convenience and necessity by the Commission authorizing transportation of commodities generally between Salt Lake City and Provo, Utah, via Heber City over U. S. Highway 40 and U. S. Highway 189, with permission to use for convenience of travel only U. S. Highway 91 between Provo and Salt Lake City but excluding local service between Salt Lake City and Provo over U.S. Highway 91. In 1958 Utah Freightways, Inc., filed a petition with the Commission in which it alleged that it believed it had authority to transport loaded vehicles between Salt Lake City and Provo over U. S. Highway 91 and a certificate authorizing such use was sought. Following a hearing the Commission (with one commissioner dissenting) held that this carrier had no right to use Highway 91 for the transportation of commodities and the petition was denied. Utah Freightways, Inc., requested the Supreme Court of Utah to review the Commission's order and in a unanimous decision issued December 27, 1959, the Commission's order was affirmed by the Court.

Realty Purchasing Company, et al., v.

Public Service Commission of Utah and
Salt Lake Transportation Company
(Supreme Court No. 8919)

The Commission issued a contract carrier permit to Salt Lake Transportation Company in February 1958 (our Case No. 4529) authorizing that company to operate as a contract motor carrier of passengers of United Air Lines, Western Airlines, Frontier Airlines, and Bonanza Air Lines from the Salt Lake Municipal Airport to the Hotel Utah, Newhouse Hotel, and Temple Square Hotel in Salt Lake City, and from said hotels to the airport. Several protestants, including cab companies and other hotels, joined in a petition to the Supreme Court of Utah for a review of the Commission's proceedings and its order. Three principal objections to the order were voiced by these protestants as follows: (a) that the proposed operation is a taxicab service and exempt from regulation by the Commission; and in the alternative, if it is not (b) the Commission erred in issuing a contract carrier permit because the proposed service is that of a common carrier; and (c) that the order is abritrary and discriminatory because it designates only three hotels as pick-up and delivery points. The order of the Commission was affirmed by the Court on October 23, 1959, with one dissent.

Wycoff Company, Inc., v.

Public Service Commission of Utah
(Supreme Court No. 9204)

Wycoff Company, Inc., filed an application with the Commission (our Case No. 4252 Sub 2) for state-wide express authority. Near the conclusion of the hearing in the matter Wycoff proposed an amendment which had the effect, among other things, of restricting the application to "transportation of shipments of not to exceed one hundred pounds." Upon the basis of this stipulation most of the protesting carriers withdrew from the case. On January 21, 1958, the Commission entered its findings and conclusions in the case wherein it incorporated the restrictive amendment verbatim, but through error the word items instead of the word shipments appeared in the order which followed the findings and conclusions, so that the quoted phrase as it appeared in the order read "transportation of items not to exceed one hundred pounds." The Commission issued a nunc pro tunc order on December 21, 1959, changing the word items to shipments. It is this order that Wycoff asked the Supreme Court to review. The Supreme Court in almost record time (a matter of a few days) after argument handed down a unanimous decision affirming the order of the Commission.

Joint Board Hearings

There were 11 hearings conducted by joint boards under the Federal Motor Carrier Act for operating authority in which a Utah commissioner or its examiner sat. After conclusion of such a hearing the joint board involved submits a recommendation to the Interstate Commerce Commission for disposition of the case. Ten of these hearings were held in Salt Lake City and one in Phoenix, Arizona.

Summary of Commission Orders

In past reports of the Commission a table was included which reflected the number of formal cases pending at the beginning of the report period, new cases filed during the period, cases disposed of, and number of cases pending at the close of the fiscal year period. This table did not include any figures covering orders issued in reopened cases or in proceedings in which sub numbers were assigned by the Commission to cases that had been treated as closed in prior reports. The information contained in such table, therefore, did not present a complete portrayal of the volume of the Commission's work.

Commencing with the current report the table referred to above has been revised to show a summary of all decisions of the Commission, together with the number of matters that were pending at the closing date of the report . Orders assigning hearing dates, fixing dates for filing of briefs, or dealing with other routine matters are not included in the table. We believe the new arrangement of the material in the table conveys a much better picture of the work load of the Commission. See Table No. 1.

SECTION II SELECTED UTILITY DATA

Electric Service and Trend of Electric Rates

Utah Power & Light Company and Telluride Power Company revised their extension policies, effective July 30, 1959. increased from \$150 to \$400 the sum it will expend to extend its service to permanent, non-seasonal customers, without financial participation or guaranteed billing on the part of the customer, while Telluride made a similar adustment from \$120 to \$400. UP&L will continue to make extensions to residential and farm customers costing over \$400 by expending up to the amount of the customer's guaranteed bill for a five-year period. Telluride now will build extensions to residential and farm customers which cost more than \$400 when the amount guaranteed over a five-year period equals the cost of the extension. In all other situations where an extension is required each company will spend three times the amount of the annual revenue which the customer guarantees. This provision will greatly liberalize Telluride's previous practice. The new policy should eliminate about 75 per cent of the quaranteed accounts of these two companies.

The trend over a period of years in the cost to the customer and use of electricity in Utah is reflected below. These figures show that the annual average consumption by residential customers continues to increase year by year. As the usage grows the annual bill of the customer also increases. The average charge per kilowatt-hour for residential service decreased slightly in 1959 over 1958 while the average charge per kilowatt-hour for all classes of service remained the same as in the previous year.

Telephone Service

During the period of this report The Mountain Telephone and Telegraph Company converted five manual exchanges to dial operation. A new dial central office was established in Logan on August 2, 1959. At that time 8,672 stations were changed from common battery to cross bar dial with equipment for automatic toll dialing known as Direct Distance Dialing. This exchange was the first in Utah equipped for DDD service. A new dial exchange in Brigham City commenced operating on February 7, 1960, with 5,425 stations. On April 24, 1960, the Farmington and Kaysville exchanges were changed from common battery to dial with 765 and 4,180 stations, respectively. The Eureka exchange was converted from manual common battery to dial operation on June 25, 1960.

The following figures show the telephones in service in the state on December 31, 1959, by the principal service classifications.

Gas Rates and Use of Natural Gas

On February 27, 1960, the following natural gas General Service Rate Schedule GS-1 of Mountain Fuel Supply Company became effective for domestic and commercial uses at any point on the company's distribution system in Utah. The new rate represents an increase of 4.47 per cent over the previous general service rate, and it provides for a minimum monthly charge of \$1.45.

The above rates are subject to a correction factor for variations in the heat value of natural gas either above or below a base of 875 British thermal units per cubic foot. Municipal franchise taxes also are added to the rates in those municipalities which impose such taxes on Mountain Fuel Supply Company.

The two companies distributing natural gas in Utah served an average of 157,556 customers during 1959, an increase of 11,132 customers over the year 1958.

The data in the following table deal with natural gas sales in Utah. It may be noted that the average charge per Mcf for residential and commercial service was less in 1959 than in 1940. The annual average consumption per customer has increased $2\frac{1}{2}$ times during this period, while the anual average bill per customer for residential and commercial service has a little more than doubled.
