SECTION I

GENERAL SUMMARY

The Public Service Commission of Utah is vested with power and jurisdiction to supervise and regulate every public utility in the state. This includes the regulation of rates, service, and practices. Public utilities regulated by the Commission include companies furnishing electric power and light service, natural gas service, culinary water service, telephone service, telegraph service, sewerage service, and carriers providing intrastate transportation of property or persons. The latter includes railroads, carriers by motor vehicle, and aircraft carriers. Municipal utility systems are not subject to regulation by the Commission.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, the Commission issued 320 orders in formal cases and 177 orders in other proceedings. These orders cover almost the entire gamut of regulation as may be seen from a review of the tables in Section III of this report. At the close of the fiscal year there were 48 docketed cases in which formal hearings were pending and nine cases in which hearings had been completed but decisions had not been issued by the Commission.

Natural Gas Rates and Service

Mountain Fuel Supply Company and Utah Gas Service Company are the only natural gas distributing companies operating in the State of Utah. The rates charged by Mountain Fuel Supply Company for service rendered to its customers remained unchanged during the period covered by this report. Utah Gas Service Company was authorized to increase its rates in an amount sufficient to offset an increase in the rate charged to it by El Paso Natural Gas Company, from which company Utah Gas Service Company obtains its entire supply of gas. The order in this proceeding was issued April 20, 1971, in Case No. 6350.

The available supplies of natural gas are inadequate to meet all of the requirements of our growing population and industries. Mountain Fuel Supply Company has been faced with declining production from its own gas reserves and also loss of a supply from a pipeline company. In an effort to overcome the growing shortage, Mountain Fuel Supply Company attempted to secure an additional 50,000 Mcf per day from El Paso Natural Gas Company but was

unsuccessful. El Paso advised Mountain Fuel that it would be entitled to contract to receive a maximum additional quantity of 12,650 Mcf per day, effective upon receipt by El Paso of additional Canadian supplies.

On September 30, 1970, El Paso filed an application with the Federal Power Commission for a general increase in its rates and charges, including those under which Mountain Fuel purchases gas from such company. The rates proposed by El Paso represented an increase to Mountain Fuel of about 24 per cent in the demand charge from \$2.273 to \$2.82 and about 38 per cent in the commodity charge from 16.9 cents to 23.29 cents per Mcf. The new rates were allowed to become effective on March 31, 1971, by the Federal Power Commission.

Mountain Fuel Supply Company filed an application with this Commission for authority to increase certain of its rates and charges to offset the higher cost of gas which it was purchasing from El Paso and from other suppliers, and to provide it with more money to be used for an expanded exploration program aimed at finding new reserves of gas. The Commission scheduled a hearing on the application for June 29, 1971. At the opening of the hearing Mountain Fuel filed amendments to its application thereby requiring a new publication of notice of hearing. The date of the hearing was reset for August 11, 1971.

On June 30, 1971, El Paso filed another application with the Federal Power Commission for a still further increase in its rates. If granted, the demand charge in the rate under which Mountain Fuel purchases gas will be increased from \$2.82 to \$3.37 per month per Mcf of contract demand and the commodity charge will be increased from 23.29 cents to 25.8 cents per Mcf.

Electric Rates and Service

There were no changes in the basic rate schedules of the electric utilities operating under the Commission's jurisdiction.

The Commission had before it the troublesome problem of the best method of providing electric service to mobile home parks. During the early years of mobile home parks the occupancy was largely transient in nature. During that period electic service was provided at a single point of delivery and the operator of the trailer park made provision for service to each house trailer and billed and collected for the service. During the late 1950's the situation began to change with the advent of more elaborate mobile homes used as places of residence on a year-round basis. With the increased popularity of deluxe mobile homes, many of the parks have become large and complex, providing all of the services usually available in a well equipped conventional house. In January 1964, the Commission issued a provisional order in respect to electric service to mobile house trailer courts which authorized electric service to one mobile trailer park to be provided on a submetering for resale basis. On November 10, 1970, the Commission issued General Order No. 92 in which it directed all electric utilities to file with the Commission rate schedules and appropriate regulations related to mobile home service. The order required the new rate schedules and regulations to provide that service may be rendered at either one point of delivery for a group of several mobile homes or at a point of delivery for each mobile home. The order contains a proviso to the effect that, if the electric energy is metered or is effectively computed in lieu of metering, the charges to the ultimate consumer may not be in excess of the established tariffs of the utility company for the type of residential occupancy involved.

Moon Lake Electric Association, Inc. purchased the common stock of Uintah Power and Light Company at various intervals between July 31, 1961, and December 31, 1968. An application was prosecuted before the Commission during 1971 in which Moon Lake requested consent and approval of the acquisition by it of all property and assets of Uintah Power. The Commission's report and order issued June 15, 1971, with one commissioner dissenting, approved the application and authorized Moon Lake to acquire all of the property and assets of Uintah Power, subject to certain conditions.

Telephone Rates and Service

The Commission had before it only one case involving an application for a general increase in telephone rates. The Midland Telephone Company, which operates in parts of Utah and Colorado, applied for authority to adjust its rates and charges upward so as to produce, company-wide, an increase of \$100,638 in its gross revenues based upon adjusted operating revenues for the year ended December 31, 1970. Approximately 93 per cent of its revenues are generated in Utah. The Commission issued its report and order on May 21, 1971 in which it found that on a total company basis the gross revenues of Midland should be increased by \$62,342. The order

provided that a proportionate equitable part of the increase in gross revenues of \$62,342 should be assigned to subscribers in the State of Utah. Following a hearing on the rates proposed to be made effective by Midland, a further order was issued on June 16, 1971, in which the Commission approved a new schedule of rates and charges designed to increase the annual Utah gross revenues of Midland by \$57,505.50. The following tabulation shows the rates in effect prior to the new schedules and those authorized by the Commission for the major classification of service.

The local service rates of Midland prior to those authorized in the orders referred to above had been in effect in Utah since October 1958. An order issued by the Commission on November 10, 1970, in Investigation Docket No. 126 authorized the adoption by Midland Telephone of the Long Distance Message Telecommunications Service Tariff of The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The Commission conducted an extensive hearing during January 1971 relating to Metropolitan Preferred Area Calling (METROPAC) offered by Mountain Bell in the Farmington, Bingham Canyon, and Kaysville exchange areas. METROPAC is an intrastate toll-free one-way outgoing station-to-station service offered to one and two-party flat rate residence and one-party flat rate business customers. Calls may be made within a 24 mile radius of the calling exchange. At the time of the hearing the METROPAC service was at a flat rate (over and above the appropriate local service rate) and unlimited calling was permitted. The Commission determined that the METROPAC service offering then in effect should not be continued. In its stead the Commission ordered that on an experimental basis the existing METROPAC rates should be continued in effect but with a time limit of 180 minutes a month for residence subscribers and 240 minutes for business subscribers plus a uniform flat rate of six cents per minute for time in excess of such allowances. The order also provided that a further study of the matter should be made and a report filed with the Commission on or

before 180 days from the date of the order which was issued February 5, 1971.

Albion Telephone Company operates primarily in the State of Idaho but it serves a few subscribers in the community of Yost in Box Elder County, Utah. An order issued February 1, 1971, authorized this company to charge its Utah subscribers the same rates and charges as were approved by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission for subscribers in Idaho effective September 1, 1969.

Mobile Radio-Telephone Service, Inc., was authorized in an order issued May 25, 1971, to increase its basic mobile radio-telephone unit charge and also the charge for installation of such units. Authority also was granted to revise other charges and the regulations in the tariff of this company to bring the charges and procedures in line with presently accepted practices for the type of service rendered.

Railroad Rates

The Commission authorized the railroads operating in the State of Utah in an order issued December 8, 1970, to increase their Utah intrastate rates and charges five per cent with the exception that no increase was granted on trainload lots of coal for metalurgical or coking purposes from Columbia, Utah, to Geneva, Utah. The increase in Utah intrastate traffic was the same as permitted by the Interstate Commerce Commission on interstate traffic in Ex Parte 265, Increased Freight Rates, 1970. The Commission found that additional revenues were necessary to take care of increasing operating costs experienced by the railroads operating in this state.

Under date of August 19, 1970, the Commission authorized the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad Company, Southern Pacific Transportation Company, and Union Pacific Railroad Company to increase their Utah intrastate passenger fares by ten per cent with a proviso that one-way fares could be rounded to the nearest five cents rather than to the next multiple of 25 cents as requested by the carriers. The increase in passenger fares was authorized to curb to some extent the continuing increase in the deficit produced by passenger operations.

AMTRAK

National Railroad Passenger Corporation (AMTRAK), a quasi-public agency established by Congress, assumed the task of

operating the nation's intercity passenger trains beginning May 1, 1971. Initially, AMTRAK was running 182 trains as an attempt to salvage a portion of the nation's deteriorating passenger train complex. At the time of the takeover, the nation's railroads were running about 300 passenger trains nationwide. The Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad Company did not join AMTRAK and as a consequence it is still running its own passenger trains. Union Pacific Railroad Company and Southern Pacific Transportation Company both joined AMTRAK and discontinued the operation of their passenger trains that had been serving the State of Utah. The Western Pacific Railroad Company discontinued passenger service in Utah when the California Zephyr completed its last run between Salt Lake City and Oakland, California, on March 22, 1970.

Other Utility Rates

The Western Union Telegraph Company was authorized in an order dated June 3, 1971, to make numerous adjustments in its Utah intrastate rates and charges designed to produce approximately \$11,400 in additional revenues from Utah intrastate operations. The evidence in this proceeding showed that Western Union was sustaining a fairly substantial loss from its intrastate operations in the State of Utah.

Highlands Water Company, Inc., which provides culinary water service to an area in Morgan County, Utah, received approval to charge a higher level of rates in an order dated June 25, 1971. The evidence showed that this Company had been operating at a loss.

Motor Carrier Rates

There were 17 orders issued by the Commission dealing with intrastate motor carrier rates. There were some increases and some decreases in rates authorized by these orders, as well as reclassifications and simplifications of tariffs. A summary of these orders is shown in Table No. 4, Section III of this report.

Grade Crossing Cases

A summary of the 42 orders issued in proceedings involving railroad grade crossings is presented in Table No. 5 of Section III. These orders dealt with numerous grade crossing matters including the construction of new crossings, construction of overpasses, the installation of crossing protection devices, the widening of existing crossings, and related matters.

Station Agency Cases

The Commission authorized Union Pacific Railroad Company to dismantle and dispose of its depot building and other facilities at its Black Rock Station and also to close its station at Layton, Utah, as an agency station. The Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad Company was authorized to close its station at Ephraim as an agency station. REA Express also was authorized to close its agency at Ephraim.

Certificates Issued to Public Utilities

There were 15 orders released by the Commission in which a certificate of convenience and necessity was issued authorizing a public utility operation or an existing certificate was modified or supplemented. The new certificates include authority for Empire Electric Association, Inc., to provide electric service in an area in San Juan County; an authorization for Morgan Enterprises Water System Company to operate a culinary water system in a portion of Morgan County; a certificate authorizing Summit Park Water Company to render culinary water service for the Summit Park Subdivision; and a certificate authorizing Navajo Communications Company, Inc., to provide public telephone service within an area in San Juan County. The last named certificate provides for the operation of a telephone system on the Navajo Indian reservation. This system was previously operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior of the United States Government, and serves the telephone communication requirements on the Navajo Indian Reservation which is located in Utah, Arizona and New Mexico. Navajo Communications Company, Inc., commenced operations on August 1, 1970.

A summary of the certificates issued to public utilities is shown in Table No. 7 in Section III.

Motor Carrier Operating Authority

Hearings and the preparation of reports and orders dealing with motor carrier operating authority continue to occupy a considerable part of the time of the Commission and its staff. During the period covered by this report there were 140 orders issued concerning motor carrier operating authority. The following tabulation summarizes the nature of the orders issued in these cases by the Commission.

During the period covered by this report the Commission issued 17 exempt motor carrier registrations subject to annual renewal and 65 interstate exempt carrier licenses, pursuant to the provisions of Section 54-6-12, Utah Code Annotated 1953. Three exempt registrations and 28 interstate exempt licenses were canceled. Under the law, each exempt carrier is required to maintain evidence on file with the Commission that the carrier has public liability and property damage insurance in effect on the motor vehicles used in conducting exempt carrier operations.

Aircraft Carriers

Under the existing law aircraft carriers operating for public service for hire in intrastate transportation of persons or property in Utah are subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission, with the exception that carriers operating pursuant to a certificate of convenience and necessity issued by the Federal Government are not subject to the Commission's jurisdiction. The Commission issued 27 certificates of convenience and necessity to aircraft carriers and canceled two certificates. The certificates convey authority for transportation of passengers or property in various classes of service, some of which are performed on a regular basis and others on an irregular basis.

Railroad-Highway Grade Crossing Safety Program

The Commission's Inspection Division continued with a program of inspecting the railroad—highway grade crossings in Utah for the purpose of making an evaluation of the hazards that exist at each crossing. There were 188 crossings inspected, mapped and photographed. The maps, photographs, and other pertinent information in respect to each crossing are maintained in the Commission's office in a permanent file.

Motor Carrier Safety Program

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971, the Commission's investigators inspected and checked 4,950 motor carrier vehicles. These inspections are conducted to determine if the motor vehicles meet safety requirements and if the operation being conducted is authorized by the Commission. There were 291 citations issued, including 35 for unauthorized hauling, 58 for violation of safety rules and regulations, and 198 warning citations. The warning citations included 42 for unauthorized hauling and 156 for safety violations. The investigators ordered 42 trucks out of service that were found to be in an unsafe operating condition. There were 64 motor vehicle accidents investigated. The investigators attempt to determine if there has been a violation of prescribed rules and regulations in connection with these investigations.

Inspection of Railroad Cabooses and Locomotives

The Commission issued General Order No. 89 on January 10, 1966, in which it adopted rules and regulations relating to reasonable standards of safety, health and comfort for employees of railroads in the use and operation of cabooses and locomotives. This was done pursuant to authority contained in Section 56-1-35 through 56-1-38, Utah Code Annotated 1953, as amended. During the fiscal year covered by this report 165 cabooses and three locomotives were inspected by the Commission's investigators.

Joint Board Hearings

There were three joint board hearings conducted involving motor carrier operating rights in the State of Utah in which the Commission participated. These hearings were held pursuant to provisions of the Interstate Commerce Act administered by the Interstate Commerce Commission. Two of the joint board hearings were held in Salt Lake City and one in Denver, Colorado.

Commission Finances

Table No. 21 in Section III of this report is a statement of the Commission's finances for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1971. The total expenditures during that year were \$309,999.02, which includes \$47,869.55 as a pro rata share of the central administration costs of the Department of Business Regulation.

SECTION II

SELECTED UTILITY DATA

Electric Rates and Use of Electricity

The information in the table which follows indicates the great increase that has occurred in the use of electricity by residential customers since 1935 and the downward path in the average price of electricity for this class of service. The annual average use by residential customers of investor-owned utilities has increased more than 7½ times but the average annual bill has increased only 3½ times. The average cost per kilowatt-hour in 1970 was less than one half the cost in 1935. The average annual usage by residential customers of the cooperative associations continues to increase year by year and since 1966 the average cost per kilowatt-hour has been declining. Cooperative electric associations first became subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission in the year 1965.

Total sales of electric energy by all electric utilities under the Commission's jurisdiction amounted to 4,622,236,000 kilowatt-hours in 1970 compared with 4,295,848,000 kilowatt-hours in 1969. Sales to ultimate consumers amounted to 4,538,277,000 kilowatt-hours in 1970, an increase of 321,626,000 kilowatt-hours over the year 1969. The average number of ultimate consumers increased from 257,052 in 1969 to 264,501 in 1970. The following table shows the kilowatt-hour sales and number of customers served in the year 1970.

Natural Gas Rates and Use of Gas

The average amount of gas used by residential and commercial customers in Utah increased moderately in 1970 while the average charge per Mcf for such gas changed very slightly. The average annual bill for all of the residential and commercial customers served by the two natural gas distributing companies operating in Utah was \$155.19 in 1970. The average charge per Mcf for all classes of service was 43.9 cents. The table which follows shows comparative figures starting with the year 1940.
