CHANGES IN DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL

Executive Director

Mr. Hal S. Bennett retired as Executive Director of the Department of Business Regulation on June 30, 1975. He had served as Executive Director since May 27, 1969 when that position was created by the Utah State Legislature. Prior to that time the Chairman of the Public Service Commission also served as the Chairman of the Department of Business Regulation. Mr. Bennett took office as a Commissioner on March 4, 1949 and became Chairman of the Commission April 2, 1949. He served as Chairman until May 10, 1965 when another Chairman was appointed, but he continued to serve as a Commissioner until August 31, 1973, when he resigned to devote full time to directing the Department of Business Regulation.

Mr. Eugene S. Lambert became Executive Director of the Department of Business Regulation on July 1, 1975. He was appointed to the Public Service Commission March 1, 1972, and served until June 30, 1975. Mr. Lambert was the Secretary of the Commission from February 1, 1971 until his appointment as a Commissioner. He has had private business experience as an automobile executive and an apartment house owner.

Public Service Commission

Mr. James N. Kimball was appointed as a Commissioner on July 1, 1975. He has experience in private business where he owns a travel agency. Mr. Kimball resigned on February 29, 1976 to devote more time to his business.

Mr. Frank S. Warner served as a member and Chairman of the Commission from March 1, 1972 until April 30, 1976 when he resigned to return to private law practice.

Mrs. Milly O. Bernard of Salt Lake City was appointed to the Commission on March 1, 1976, and was appointed Chairman of the Commission on May 1, 1976. Mrs. Bernard has served as a State Representative and held the positions of Minority Whip, Minority Leader, and Majority Leader in the House of Representatives. She has been active in business and community affairs, and has received the "Mrs. Kearns" award and the Kearns Chamber of Commerce "Woman of the Year" award.

Mr. Joseph C. Folley of Ogden, Utah was appointed as a member of the Commission on May 1, 1976. He is a lawyer by profession and has practiced law in Ogden since 1947. He is a veteran of World War II, active in civic affairs, a former member of the Utah State Legislature, and a former Judge Pro Tem in the Ogden City Court.

Division of Public Utilities

Mr. Theodore E. Thain retired on June 30, 1975 after having served as Chief Accountant and Director of Utility Accounts and Finance since November 1, 1928. He also served as acting secretary of the Public Service Commission on two occasions. Mr. Thain's 47 years of service is unparalleled in the history of the Department.

Mr. Clair Johnson retired on August 27, 1975 after having served as the Commission's Court Reporter since October 21, 1942, with time off for military service during World War II.

Mrs. Evelyn J. Feldsted retired March 31, 1976 after more than 33 years of service as the Chief Docket Clerk for the Commission.

SECTION 1

GENERAL SUMMARY

The year 1976 marks the completion of fifty nine years in the history of the Public Service Commission of Utah. The Public Utilities Act was approved by the Governor on March 8, 1917, and the commission was organized April 3, 1917. At that time it consisted of three Commissioners, a stenographer, a reporter, and a special investigator. Today the Commission and the Division of Public Utilities has 33 full-time employees.

The original Commission was called the Public Utilities Commission of Utah. Legislation enacted by the 1935 Legislature changed the name to Public Service Commission by which it is known today. In 1941 there was a major reorganization of the Utah State Government. The first special session of the 1941 Legislature created a department to be known as the State Department of Business Regulation. Today the Public Service Commission is part of the Department of Business Regulation.

In 1969, another major organizational change was made by the Legislature. The Public Service Commission was made an independent part of the Department of Business Regulation, but its powers were limited to rule-making and quasi-judicial functions. The Division of Public Utilities was created to administer to enforce the actions of the Public Service Commission. The Division investigates, verifies and collects information to assist the Commission in carrying out its functions. They represent the interest of the state and consumers in utility company matters under the commissions jurisdiction. They see that matters before the Commission are properly investigated, they audit, assist in legal review, and retain professional consultants. The Attorney General's office provides legal assistance to the Division. The Livision also enforces the laws regulating public utilities and motor carriers in the state, and handles complaints against public utilities.

The regulation of public utilities is accomplished by both formal and informal procedures. The formal procedures normally involve a hearing and the taking of testimony. During the 59 years of the Commission's history, approximately 9000 formal proceedings were conducted. Informal proceedings encompass numerous areas. The largest involves motor carrier authorities. Several hundred of these matters are resolved each year.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976, the Commission issued 175 orders in formal cases and 276 orders in other proceedings. At the close of the fiscal year there were 65 cases in which formal hearings were pending and 8 cases in which hearings had been completed but decisions had not been issued by the Commission.

SECTION II

ELECTRIC

Electric Utility Rate Cases

Of the six electric utility rate cases held during the year, Case No. 7167, involving Utah Power & Light Company, was by far the most significant in regard to the amount of the increase granted and issues which arose in the proceedings.

A total increase in revenue of \$27,260,445 was granted Utah Power and Light. The company alleged in its application that they must be able to maintain a sufficently strong financial position to be able to attract the large amounts of capital which will be needed in the future so that the Company will be able to proceed with its very large construction program.

Also in this case, the quality of the earnings of the company was an issue. For this reason, the Commission found that construction work in progress should be allowed in the rate base, to be implemented over a five year period and the normalization of tax savings due to accelerated depreciation was allowed with the changeover permitted to be implemented during a three year period.

The Empire Electric Association was granted two increases in Cases 7129 and 7186. These increases were made necessary because of the increased purchased power costs from Colorado Ute Electric Association. The increases were \$5,922 and \$12,433 respectfully.

In Case No. 7146 Strawberry Water Users Association was authorized to collect for losses incurred during a severe snow storm. The storm did considerable damage to the power distribution system.

In Case No. 7147 Utah Power and Light Company was authorized to increase rates because of fuel cost increases resulting from negotiated labor settlements between independent contractors and the United Mine Workers Union. The total increase granted was \$2,293,000

In Case No. 7196 California-Pacific Utilities Company was allowed to increase rates by 2.8% to recover the increased cost of energy which it purchases from Utah Power and Light Company. The 2.8% increase would generate revenues in the amount of \$92,982.

Electric Rates and Use of Electricity

The table below shows information on the use and cost of electricity for selected years beginning with the 1935. During 1975 there was a slight decrease in the annual average use per residential customer served by the two investor-owned companies and

a 25.2 percent increase in the average charge per kilowatt-hour as compared to the corresponding figures for 1974. The annual average use per residential customer served by the twelve cooperative electric associations increased by 7.9 percent during 1975 over 1974 and there was only a slight increase in the average charge per kilowatt-hour. The annual average bill per residential customer served by the investor-owned companies exceeded, for the first time, the average bill per customer served by the cooperative associations.

A summary of the kilowatt-hours sold and the average number of customers served in Utah by electric utilities regulated by the Commission during the year ending December 31, 1975, is portrayed in the following table. There was an increase of 6.2 percent in the number of kilowatt-hours sold to ultimate consumers and an increase of 103.1 percent in the number of kilowatt-hours sold for resale during 1975 over 1974. The total revenue earned from sales of electricity amounted to \$182,800,979 or an increase of 40.8 percent over 1974, and the average number of customers increased by 13,136, or an increase of 4.2 percent.

SECTION III

GAS

Mountain Fuel Supply Company Rate Proceedings

Mountain Fuel Supply Company filed an application, Case No. 7113 — II, on March 27, 1975, for a general rate increase in the State of Utah of \$13,512,956. The amount requested was subsequently reduced to \$13,202,723. The initial hearing commenced on May 28, 1975, and additional hearings were held from June 30 to July 10, 1975, and July 28 to August 7, 1975. The record in the revenue requirement phase of the hearing consisted of 2862 pages of transcript and 83 exhibits. A total of 21 witnesses testified during the proceedings.

The Commission granted an interim increase on August 15, 1975, of \$5,966,121 or 45.42 percent of the amount requested. On December 1, 1975, the Commission granted an additional increase of \$3,480,010 or another 26.36 percent of the amount requested.

An additional hearing was held on January 19, 1976, to determine the final adjustments necessary in Case No.'s 7113 - II, 7150 - I, 7150 - II, 7172 - I, and 7172 - II, to conform with the final test data determined in Case No. 7113 - II. The Commission issued an order on April 29, 1976, granting an additional \$59,062.

An additional increase was granted on December 1, 1975, in the amount of \$1,498,592 to offset the repeal of the oil and gass depletion allowance by the Internal Revenue Service.

There were three other rate increases totaling \$12,586,275 and two rate decreases totaling \$1,620,085 granted during the year due to changes in the cost of gas purchased by Mountain Fuel.

The total net increase in rates allowed Mountain Fuel amounted to \$21,999,975. The changes in rates were all spread to Mountain Fuel's customers on a uniform cents per Mcf basis. The effect on the typical residential GS-1 customer using 180,000 cubic feet of gas per year was to raise the annual bill by \$29.69 or 17.98 percent.

Utah Gas Service Company Rate Proceedings

Utah Gas Service Company which serves in the Vernal, Moab, and Monticello areas was granted a total of \$538,114 in rate increases during the year. These increases raised the typical residential customer's annual bill by \$37.09 or 17.71 percent.

Pass throughs of increased gas costs amounted to \$460,288 or 85.54 percent of the total increases granted. The balance of \$77,826 was granted in a general rate case.

The application of the general rate case, Case No. 7117 was filed on April 2, 1975, asking for an increase of \$394,449. Hearings were held in Moab on May 12,

1975; in Vernal on May 13, 1975; and in Salt Lake on May 14, 15, and 23, 1975. The Commission's order was issued on September 23, 1975 granting \$77,826 or 19.73 percent of the amount requested.

Another hearing of interest was held in Case No. 7190. this hearing commenced on March 18, 1976 and the Commission issued its order on April 15, 1976. Utah Gas Service asked for an increase of \$127, 552. The Company felt the increase was necessary to offset the loss of revenues that Utah Gas Service should have collected from Northwest Pipeline Corporation for gas sold for resale in interstate commerce. However, due to Utah Gas Service's failure to properly file tariffs with the Federal Power Commission, the Company was unable to collect an increased price for gas sold to Northwest. The Commission denied the application stating that there was insufficient justification that other customers of Utah Gas Service should make up the losses in sales to Northwest. Utah Gas Service appealed the Commission's decision to the Utah Supreme Court.

Natural Gas Rates and Use of Gas

The annual average bill per residential and commercial customer increased \$59.52 or 35.6 percent during 1975 over 1974. The primary causes of this increase were an increase of 18.6 cents or 24.0 percent in the average charge per Mcf and a 9.4 percent increase in the annual average use per customer. Usage and cost of natural gas is shown on the next table for selected years beginning with 1940.

The total revenue earned from the sale of natural gas in Utah amounted to \$101,394,161 during 1975. There was an average of 297,291 customers served during the year. The number of Mcf sold to industrial customers was the lowest since 1965 and was lower than the number sold to residential and commercial customers for only the second time in history. Sales of natural gas by major service classifications is shown in the next table for selected years beginning with the year 1940.

Natural Gas Pipeline Safety

The United States Congress passed the Natural Gas Pipeline Safety Act of 1968 which provided that the Federal Government would establish "Minimum Safety Standards" for the transportation or storage of natural and other gases by pipeline systems.

The Act provides for the Federal Department of Transportation to take over safety jurisdiction of interstate systems and allows certifying states to handle intrastate systems as long as they enforce equal or more stringent standards. Utah has been so certified and handles these matters through the staff of the Division of Public Utilities. Utah also handles interstate Pipeline Safety. Utah is reimbursed for 50 percent of the expenses for interstate and intrastate pipeline safety activities including the following:

The Division makes periodic inspections of each gas operator's installations and records. This includes all interstate operators and Mountain Fuel Supply and Utah Gas Service Co. who are the main intrastate operators; also propane operators with piped systems which are regulated under special circumstances and nearly all master metered apartment complexes and mobile home parks. This includes a review of their safety procedures; communication facilities; leak detection and repair practices; engineering detail and standards; personnel training and testing, public information programs, emergency planning and response; accident investigation; safety tests of equipment; construction practices and other matters related to pipeline safety.

There were 279 Inspection Reports completed during this period in addition to many contacts made which were not described in formal reports. This included a few oil line inspections which were made on a cooperative basis for the Office of Pipeline Safety Operations.

SECTION IV

COMMUNICATIONS

Telephone Cases

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1976, five orders were issued involving rates of telephone companies.

In Case 170, Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph Company was allowed to increase rates by \$5,238,352. This additional revenue was generated by increasing rates in three general areas: first, service charges for installations, moves and changes of equipment; second, changes in the intrastate long distance, wide area telecommunications service and switched network service rates; and third, an increase in the METROPAC rates.

In Case 7130, Uintah Basin Telephone Association was granted a total of \$52,824. These increases were necessary to provide adequate service and cover all reasonable and necessary operating expenses, taxes and interest on debt.

In Case 7164, Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph Company was allowed to charge 20 cents for each directory assistance service call over five on each central office line per month. This charge resulted in a cost savings to Mountain Bell of approximately \$1,265,000.

Emery County Farmers Union Telephone Association was granted increased rates of \$40,354 in Case 7169. The applicant alleged its present outside plant had deteriorated to the point where there were frequent interruptions in service. In order to remedy these problems, the applicant is in the process of upgrading and expanding its present plant to provide a better grade of service.

In Case 7185, Continental Telephone Company of Utah was granted \$242,311 of rate relief. This increase was due to a change in accounting and an increase in the rate of return the company was allowed to earn.

Telephone Service

The number of telephones in service at December 31, 1975 is shown by major classification of service in the following table. In addition to the number of telephones served there were 1,739 subscribers to paging services provided by telephone companies.

SECTION V

WATER

There are 23 regulated water companies in the state. Two are both water and sewer utilities. Five applied for rate increases. The total requested increase was \$102,776, of which \$65,479 was granted. (See Table 2.)

On February 25, 1976, in Case No. 5572 - Sub 2 and Sub 4, Highlands Water Company was granted an increase of \$12,103 and an addition to its certificated territory.

The Commission denied the Company's request to install a secondary system for irrigation and requested the Company to bring its accounting records into compliance with the Uniform System of Accounts.

On October 1, 1975 an increase of \$1,083 was granted to Morgan Enterprises Water Company in Case No. 7114. This increase included a new connection fee of \$1,000.

Terra Utilities, a water and sewer utility in Bloomington, Utah, requested an increase of \$36,985 in Case No. 7116. The request was denied on June 14, 1976 by the Commission which based its decision on a "used and useful" concept. The Division of Public Utilities proposed that utility plant be donated by the developer and thereby removed from rate base but the proposal was denied by the Commission.

Terra was also ordered to convert its accounting so as to comply with the NARUC Uniform System of Accounts.

Highland Utility Corp., the other regulated water and sewer utility in the State, received a \$288 increase in Case No. 7157 on May 21, 1976. This was 48% of the requested \$600. The Company was also ordered to comply with the Uniform System of Accounts and to commence installation of meters for all customers.

In Case No. 7148 on January 6, 1976, White City Water, the largest regulated water utility in the State, was granted an increase of \$52,005 which was 100% of its request.

In addition to the above, Crossroads Water Company was issued Certificate No. 1877 to operate as a public utility near Silver Creek Junction and was ordered to provide a tariff and to comply with the Uniform System of Accounts (Case No. 7199, May 6, 1976); Nordic Valley Water Company was allowed an expansion of its certificated territory (Case No. 5627-Sub 2, January 13, 1976); the decision in Case No. 7079 on Wanship Cottage Water Company was pending and applications had been received, but not heard, from Bear River Canal Company, Bridgerland Village Water Company (2 cases), Woodland Bench Water Company, Dammeron Corp. and Pine Valley Ranchos Water Company.

SECTION VI

TRANSPORTATION

Motor Carrier Operating Authority

Hearings and reports dealing with motor carrier operating authority continue to occupy a considerable part of the time of the Commission and its staff. During this fiscal year 244 orders were issued concerning motor carrier operating authority. Following is a summary of these orders.

Exempt Motor Carriers

Certain motor carriers are exempt from regulation by the Commission, under Section 54-6-12 Utah Code Annotated 1953. These carriers must still register their operations with the Commission, file evidence of insurance, and comply with safety regulations.

During the fiscal year, the Commission issued 59 exempt intrastate licenses and 498 exempt interstate licenses. The Commission also canceled 19 intrastate exempt licenses and 171 interstate exempt licenses.

Motor Carrier Investigation and Enforcement

The Division's investigators inspect passenger buses, trucks, and other vehicles operated by common and contract carriers and by exempt and private carriers. By House Bill No. 22, the Division transferred one investigator over to the State Department of Transportation, leaving the Division with three enforcement officers located in Hyrum, Salt Lake City, and Vernal.

The increased work load and efficiency is reflected as follows: For the fiscal years 1975-1976 versus 1974-1975 there was an increase of 39.9% in the number of citations issued per officer. For the same period there was a 115.9% increase in the amount of fines collected per officer.

The Division's investigators inspected 2556 motor vehicles during fiscal year 1975-1976 and issued 345 citations. Sixty-five citations were for unauthorized hauling, 59 for cab card stamp violations and 221 for violations of safety rules and regulations. There were also 45 warnings for violations of safety rules and 22 vihicles were ordered "out of service" for unsafe conditions. There were 54 motor vehicle accidents investigated.

Approximately \$19,349 was received in fines by the various counties in which citations were written. The Commission collected \$47,500.50 in revenue from the issuance of 109,398 cab card identification stamps. Included in this figure are 14,397 free stamps issued to Utah based vehicles and reciprocating states. The reciprocating states are California, Michigan, Missouri, Oklahoma and North Carolina.

Air Carrier Rates

The Commission issued three orders in cases involving the State's two air carriers. All three orders were granting rate increases. Table 5 is a summary of these orders.

Grade Crossing Cases

There were six orders issued in cases involving railroad highway crossings in Utah. These orders were mainly for the installation of additional protective devices at crossings. The responsibility of railroad crossings and railroad inspections was transferred to the State Department of Transportation, and the Public Service Commission will no longer be involved in these matters. Refer to Table 6.

Station Agency and Stockyard Facilities

Seven orders were issued during the year. They involved the abandonment of stockyards or the closing of agency stations. Also a mobile agency was established. This is detailed in Table 7.

Public Utilities Certificated or Canceled

Three utilities received additions to their service areas, and two new utilities were formed — Crossroads Water Company and Carbon Emery Communications. The Continental Telephone Company of Utah was formed by the merger of two existing telephone companies. One of the oldest utilities in the state was closed when Clearfield Steam Company went out of business and the certificate was canceled.

Railroad Rates

There were four orders issued concerning railroad rate increases. Two orders allowed general freight rate increases of 7% and 5% for the nine railroads operating in the state. The Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad was allowed increases in passenger fares and specific freight rates. These orders are summarized in Table 3.

Motor Carrier Rates

Twenty-four orders were issued involving motor carrier rates. There were some increases and some decreases authorized. They involve individual carriers, or groups of carriers represented by the Intermountain Tariff Bureau. Table 4 gives a summary of these orders.
