MR. TAYLOR: Thank you. My name is David L. Taylor. I'm the manager of regulatory affairs for the State of Utah for Rocky Mountain Power. Just like to briefly give an overview of the filing that we made the 1st of September.

For a number of years Rocky Mountain Power has collected funds from its customers to fund a low-income surcharge to help offset bills for, for eligible low-income customers.

In November 2009, in response to Senate Bill 75, the rules associated with that low-income surcharge and the low-income credit were changed. And at that time we filed for an increase in both the low-income surcharge, which -- and the low-income credit that's funded -- that's provided to customers through Rate Schedule No. 3, that that credit was raised to \$11 a month.

Since that time, participation from eligible customers has increased significantly. And it's reached a point in the last few months where the collections under Rate Schedule 91 are no longer adequate to support and to fund the credits being provided to low-income customers.

As a result of that, on the 1st of September we made this filing, requesting a change and increase to Rate Schedule 91. As Mr. Solander indicated, this change brings the surcharge to approximately .35 percent of revenues from customer classes. With the exception of those few classes which are at the \$50-a-month cap that was set by the legislation. Just for reference, the legislation allows the surcharge to go up to one-half of one percent of annual revenues. And so we're about two-thirds of what the maximum allowed under the statute would

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provide.

We made this filing. We circulated it with interested parties. And the Division of Public Utilities and the Office of Consumer Services both filed comments in support of this action. suspect they will address those comments through their own witnesses.

So with that, I'm happy to answer any questions that you may have or that the parties may have. And we would encourage you to approve the requested filing. Thank you.

- Q. (By Ms. Schmid) Ms. Roll, do you have a summary you'd like to give today?
- A. Yes, just a brief summary. The Division of Public Utilities reviewed the application filed by Rocky Mountain Power in Docket No. 11-035-T07, Advice No. 11-07, the Low-Income Lifeline Program, for the proposed changes to Schedule 91.

As stated by Mr. Taylor, the passage of Utah Senate Bill 75 increased the low-income credit and the surcharge collection rate as of November 1, 2009. The number of qualifying residential customers receiving these credits has increased significantly, and the credits provided under Schedule 3 have exceeded the collections under the Schedule 91 surcharge, making it necessary to increase the Schedule 91 surcharge.

Rocky Mountain Power is estimating that the eligible residential customers will increase at a rate of 3 percent over the next 12 months. The Division will continue to review the reports provided by Rocky Mountain Power to assure that the collections remain approximately at the level of the credits that are provided to the customers qualifying for the Low-Income Lifeline Program.

1	For residential customers the surcharge is
2	proposed to increase by \$0.03 per month, from \$0.23 to
3	\$0.26. And as Mr. Taylor stated, the schedules that
4	are at the 50-percent cap will not be changed.
5	These changes are in accordance with the
6	parties' agreement to the rate design stipulation in
7	Docket No. 08-035-38, and so the Division recommends
8	that the Commission approve the proposed changes to
9	Schedule 91. Thank you.

MS. WOLF: Sure. My name is Betsy Wolf. I'm a utility ratepayer advocate. And I work for Salt Lake Community Action Program, which is located at 764 South 200 West, in Salt Lake City. And we did not submit written comments so I just wanted to make a brief, brief statement today.

Salt Lake Community Action Program has worked with the Company on the proposed tariff changes. I've reviewed the details that were submitted on September 1st, and recommend that the tariff changes be approved by the Public Service Commission.

With the continuing difficult economy we have seen an increase in the number of households served by this program, and we believe it's important to ensure that the benefits to eligible households are maintained.

It is also important that the surcharge remains reasonable, as there are many in this state who are struggling with reduced household incomes who may not be eligible for the Lifeline program.

Therefore, Salt Lake Community Action Program believes that this is a balanced proposal which provides continued funding for eligible households with a minimal increase in the surcharge, and we recommend its adoption. Thank you.
