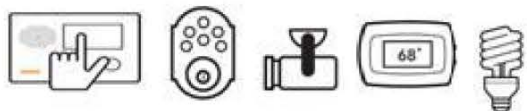

I just heard about the bid by Rocky Mountain power to shift to a very regressive rate structure for those who want to invest in clean energy production by installing Solar panels.

I am one of those people who have wanted to make that investment, but have not yet been able to. This rate change is absurd, and removes any financial incentive, which as it was barely would cover the cost of the investment. Instead of growing the clean energy production in the state this will encourage more burning of coal. Is that what we want?

The idea that my putting solar on my roof, shifts the cost to my neighbors is preposterous. By the same logic, we should have a tariff for anyone who reduces their power consumption by any method. Is there any difference to RMP and my neighbors if I am able to reduce my power consumption by 500kwh by moving to more efficient appliances, more efficient lightbulbs, and other means of reducing my power? How is it that my neighbor will now how to cover the cost of my reduction. Is it any different if I make that reduction in usage, by efficiency or by generating my own clean energy?

The idea that RMP gets to essentially set a baseline power charge for everyone regardless of their usage is not reasonable. This new rate structure seeks to do exactly that. Because I would not be using as much .14 tier power, I am going to have to pay more for my tier 1 and 2 power.

And what if I go off the grid altogether? Will RMP now be able to just bill me for not using any power as well? It is sad enough that net metering is capped below 100%. Would it not be better for my solar to be able to serve my neighbors and further reduce the amount of coal we are burning? Is the air quality not suffering enough on those inversion days?

That Michele Beck, director of the Utah Office of Consumer Services, agrees that, ". . . it is empirically true that residential net-metering customers are shifting costs to regular residential customers", belies logic. How is it that an improvement of efficiency, resulting in a reduction of power consumption at my home, shifts the cost to my neighbors?

Finally, while I understand well the concept of peak billing, and can see how it makes sense for RMP. If it makes sense for solar users, it makes sense for all power users. RMP has to build for peak power consumption, solar does not hinder that, it actually improves that situation as solar generation is greatest during the hours of peak consumption. The result of solar is to buffer what RMP has to build for, thus reducing RMP costs. RMP still has to build for the peak power of my neighbor it has nothing to do with solar, and to penalize only the solar users, is backwards of the justification of this proposal. It shifts the cost from those who have not invested in solar, who are driving up the need for greater consumption of dirty energy, to those who are trying to move forward to a cleaner future.

Let's not follow Nevada's plan, and destroy the solar market. Let's move forward, not remain bound in the past. One day the coal will run low, the water in our dams will be low. And we will wish more people had solar, not fewer.

To Whom It May Concern;

I installed solar and went on-line in July of 2016 (at a cost to me - after State and Federal rebates - of nearly 10% of the current value of my home) . This system has eliminated my electric bill and of fset it with an equivalent loan payment approximately equal to my former monthly electrical bill - that I will pay for twenty years) EXCEPT for the \$8 minimum fee (\$6 basic charge and \$2 minimum charge) the utility charges to remain connected to Rocky Mountain Power (RMP - aka Pacific Corporation).

Although the claim is that I will be 'grandfathered' and allowed to stay on the current rate agreement; new users will be required to accept a new rate agreement. The new terms have not yet been disclosed; and there is no guaranty that current users will never be affected by the change.

I can see the RMP concern: their antiquated short-sighted business model (that built infrastructure costs into the KWh rate) is becoming obsolete and no longer gives them the profits they planned for their shareholders, as alternative energy sources become mainstream. Yet they want to penalize and pressure these modern 'resources' to protect their interests. I get it; but the fact that they are essentially a monopoly , is the very reason they should be controlled to protect the public.

Even now their powerful lobbyists have garnered concessions with the Utah Public Service Commission (UPSC). In the RMP service area, solar producers are only allowed a 'no cash value' KWh for KWh 'credit' for excess daytime (peak time) power production (other progressive states allow a cash value exchange). This power is resold (at RMP discretion), potentially to peak time users at a higher value than credit given the producer when needed for nighttime (of peak hours) use. Plus, they are under no obligation to allow producers to carry credits beyond March of each year; when at which time RMP 'zeros' any remaining credit for the year, and keeps the value (other progressive states allow credits to be carried or cashed out).

These dubious practices alone, should garner RMP sufficient value to offset any impact to the value of utility infrastructure costs. Further, the growing impact of solar reduces pressure to build new power plants; which is likely one of the industry's largest infrastructure expenses. Also, the industry seems to forget that much of the 'short transmission infrastructure' is already paid for by homeowners, builders, municipalities and businesses as neighborhoods and retail/industrial zones are constructed.

I encourage the UPSC to stand strong for the future of alternative energy production and fairness to those who seek to be part of the solution to becoming more energy independent.

I just heard about the bid by Rocky Mountain power to shift to a very regressive rate structure for those who want to invest in clean energy production by installing Solar panels. I am one of those people who have wanted to make that investment, but have not yet been able to. This rate change is absurd, and removes any financial incentive, which as it was barely would cover the cost of the investment. Instead of growing the clean energy production in the state this will encourage more burning of coal. Is that what we want? The idea that my putting solar on my roof, shifts the cost to my neighbors is preposterous. By the same logic, we should have a tariff for anyone who reduces their power consumption by any method. Is there any difference to RMP and my neighbors if I am able to reduce my power consumption by 500kwh by moving to more efficient appliances, more efficient lightbulbs, and other means of reducing my power? How is it that my neighbor will now how to cover the cost of my reduction. Is it any different if I make that reduction in usage, by efficiency or by generating my own clean energy? The idea that RMP gets to essentially set a baseline power charge for everyone regardless of their usage is not reasonable. This new rate structure seeks to do exactly that. Because I would not be using as much .14 tier power, I am going to have to pay more for my tier 1 and 2 power. And what if I go off the grid altogether? Will RMP now be able to just bill me for not using any power as well? It is sad enough that net metering is capped below 100%. Would it not be better for my solar to be able to serve my neighbors and further reduce the amount of coal we are burning? Is the air quality not suffering enough on those inversion days? That Michele Beck, director of the Utah Office of Consumer Services, agrees that, ". . . it is empirically true that residential net-metering customers are shifting costs to regular residential customers", belies logic. How is it that an improvement of efficiency, resulting in a reduction of power consumption at my home, shifts the cost to my neighbors? Finally, while I understand well the concept of peak billing, and can see how it makes sense for RMP. If it makes sense for solar users, it makes sense for all power users. RMP has to build for peak power consumption, solar does not hinder that, it actually improves that situation as solar generation is greatest during the hours of peak consumption. The result of solar is to buffer what RMP has to build for, thus reducing RMP costs. RMP still has to build for the peak power of my neighbor it has nothing to do with solar, and to penalize only the solar users, is backwards of the justification of this proposal. It shifts the cost from those who have not invested in solar, who are driving up the need for greater consumption of dirty energy, to those who are trying to move forward to a cleaner future. Let's not follow Nevada's plan, and destroy the solar market. Let's move forward, not remain bound in the past. One day the coal will run low, the water in our dams will be low. And we will wish more people had solar, not fewer.

As a citizen of Utah and a participant in the Utah solar industry I'd like to raise my concerns in regards to Docket Number: 14-035-114.

I respect the point of view of Rocky Mountain Power and it's share holders and would advocate that this if passed, this proposal would be unprofitable and risky for Rocky Mountain Power. I commend the grandfathering clause and avoiding some of the mistakes of NV Energy. Realistically the public outcry and PR storm against this aggressive of a policy could easily result in deregulation as it did in Nevada. The Utah market wants solar and its not just 20 mW in the desert. We want solar as a solution to our air quality problem. Within a decade I could be raising children in a valley of electric vehicles charged by solar power.

I also humbly suggest the commission made a mistake in not requiring a more rigorous analysis of the long terms costs and benefits of the net metering program including the shared resource benefits to our local environment and economy

My understanding is that the original net-metering law for Utah, SB 84, explicitly allowed for up to 20% of the 2007 peak demand for Rocky Mountain Power. This equates to aprox. 920mW. This year I investigated this issue to see how much net metered generation has been added to the grid since then. My understanding was around 33 mW and on track to be over 50mW by the end of the year. That is only 5.4% of allowed capacity. I don't see why we couldn't agree to at least go that far with a fair net metering program in the state. As we transition to electric vehicle added capacity will be very important and solar a boon to the power company.

The solar industry and utility do not have to remain at odds. We can find a comprise that is fair to both industries and the public. I'm hopeful a reasonable compromise can be reached that will allow for the solar industry to continue to thrive in Utah.

I am writing to provide customer input regarding Rocky Mountain Power's proposal to increase rates for solar customers.

As a Rocky Mountain Power customer who has solar, I am very concerned about their proposal to increase rates specifically for solar users, especially in light of their own efforts to invest in and promote use of solar production. I chose to mount solar panels on my home more than a year ago in an effort to reduce my energy consumption and costs. I chose this route not only to be ecologically minded, but also because energy rates are so high and there is no other option besides Rocky Mountain Power for services. With no other options, we are locked into the rates that the monopoly requires. Their proposed rate hikes that are masked as maintenance fees are attempts to keep hold of a monopoly that should not exist. Further, by singling out solar customers, the implications go beyond trying to preserve their monopoly. Supporting their efforts to preserve the monopoly set a precedent to any other companies that they can single out a specific group and charge them unique rates. Further, not all solar recipients mount enough solar to offset production by 100%. We chose to only offset by 80%, so we still consume energy through RMP that supports maintenance fees, but what about solar recipients who only offset by 50% or less. To raise their rates simply because they have solar is unconscionable.

Finally, to disrupt the solar industry by charging outrageous rates to solar recipients will have specific and direct impact on the economy by eliminating jobs and discouraging people to consider alternative forms of energy that protect our ecology.

Please consider that you will have certain and specific impact on more than maintenance costs to RMP by increasing rates for solar customers.

As I understand it, one of the tasks of the Public Service Commission is to **protect the interests of the citizens by regulating the monopolies** (utility companies) that they oversee. With respect to Rocky Mountain Power's proposed changes to policies and rates for roof-top solar, I would suggest that to adequately represent the public interest, you should (at a minimum) do the following:

1. Perform an **independent** analysis of the costs and benefits to the public of roof-top solar. The Public Service Commission will be derelict in its duty to the **public** if it only accepts and "rubber stamps" RMP's claimed costs and proposed rate and fee increases without verifying claimed costs and fully accounting for resulting **benefits** to the public. Said benefits must include **"externalities"** avoided—including air pollution. RMP's proposed timeline for their proposed changes (Dec. 10th), clearly does not allow enough time for the PSC to independently and comprehensively analyze these alleged costs and benefits. Why such a **rush**? Is it because RMP hopes to have their proposal approved before it can be thoroughly examined?
2. If said rate and fee increases are in fact warranted and approved, the **effective date** should be such that potential roof-top solar customers can adjust their plans accordingly. Customers (**citizens**) who made decisions regarding solar under one set of rules should not be **penalized** by having the rules (costs and fees) changed on them without **adequate notice** so as to enable them to modify their plans to reflect the new rules.

I hope and trust that the Public Service Commission will indeed consider and represent the interests of the **public** in this matter—and not just "rubber stamp" RMP's proposal!

Request (Closed): Dear Governor Herbert, I am writing this email to express my disapproval of Rocky Mountain Power's proposed changes to the Net Energy Metering tariff, currently in review by the Utah Public Service Commission under Docket No. 14-035-114. The proposed changes, while being portrait as a means to 'normalize' the 'cost' of residential rooftop solar across all rate payers, will in fact discourage any home owner of investing in residential solar. As an example of how these changes would reach this effect, rather than normalizing cost across rate payers, can be found in Nevada where similar changes to the NEM policies were adopted after the Nevada PSC voted for a very similar rate change proposal from NV Energy. The result of this adoption was a near complete halt of investment in rooftop solar. It is understandable that a company as Rocky Mountain Power and PacifiCorp will want to maintain their monopoly position, however, this does not serve the consumer in the best way. The core of our American Capitalistic system revolves around the freedom of choice and competition. In addition to this, the addition of distributed generation to the Electricity Grid has been proven to reduce cost for the grid maintainer as loads are more distributed and balanced. My final argument to oppose this change, is that it most certainly will terminate the vibrant and growing Solar Industry in Utah, employing thousands. This industry not only employs Utahns but contributes to cleaning up what is probably one of the worst air climate situations in the country. It seems that PacifiCorp and Rocky Mountain Power care more about a short-term profit than the well-being of the people of our state. Your leadership on this matter is of the utmost importance.
