Dear utility commission,

I am a sales person for a solar company. The current proposals by rocky mountain power in their entirety would make it impossible to sell solar. Ninety nine percent of everyone purchases solar because it is less expensive that paying a full bill with rocky Mountain solar. A small additional connection fee of possibly \$10 total instead of the current connection fee would be OK but any of the other measures would kill it. I calculate based on their proposals that an average 5kw household would pay \$60 in additional fees. The Phoenix area implemented similar measures and it destroyed all solar sales. Nevada implemented similar measures and it killed the industry.

Nevada Energy stated it would have minimal effect. This was entirely untrue. Solar doesn't exist without net metering at a one to one rate and a low connection fee.

I sell 5 to 9 rooftop solar customers per week and not one of them would have moved forward with the project with rocky mountains current proposals.

This will mean our company and all the other solar companies will go out of business and all of us will be laid of f. Rocky Mountain is frustrated that they are not making mass profits of f of each customer even though the customer is relieving them having to produce the energy on their own.

My customers are frustrated by the greed of rocky Mountain power and having difficulty paying their bills. All the best in your decisions,

Dear Ms. or Mr.

I am opposed to the recent rate proposal of Rocky Mountain Power (RMP) to penalize future solar installations.

Although I have been interested in solar panels on the house for some time, within the last month I have been pursuing Solar City for specifications and costs. I have put that all on hold till I see what becomes of this new rate proposal.

1) I believe there is already a "user fee" on my monthly invoice. If I do not use a single kilowatt of power I still will be charged a minimum fee. I do think this is fair. I have the luxury of using their system or not. RMP provides an indispensable product.

2) I would re-evaluate my solar project, and possibly still go forward, if the state would discontinue the \$2,000 rebate but not change the rate structure. But hopefully both will stay intact in their present form.

3) The recent rate proposal, if passed/accepted by the PSC, would definitely stop any solar install for my property . I believe in renewable energy but I need to see a payback within the material's lifetime.

4) If the proposal is rejected in its entirety, would RMP be able to wait one cycle and submit another proposal again? Hoping to beat us down until we give in?

5) Why fabricate a problem when there is none? Even if solar installations double each year, after 10 years, this will still only be approximately 2% - 3% of the customer base.

This proposal would slow down improvements in air quality and take a step backwards in the development of clean energy.

Utah is situated wonderfully for solar applications. This is a great selling point for future businesses to assess when looking to relocate or expand to Utah.

It may be too late for this comment, but I want it on record anyway. With respect to this request to increase rates for net metering, it seems that the arguments made by Rocky Mountain Power have almost entirely to do with management of the power grid during peak and of peak hours, which is exactly what they are paid to do. I have read through the testimony of the RMP experts and can see that this transition is disruptive to their system management, but no amount of difficulty will save us from the ultimate price we will be paying (and in the very near future) if we do not reverse the effects of greenhouse gases and global climate change.

I am not yet a rooftop solar system owner, but plan to be very soon. My husband and I have been preparing and researching for this transition for two years. I have purchased Blue Sky power from RMP since it became available. If you do not continue to support the transition to cleaner, renewable energy in whatever form it comes, our planet is literally cooked. The latest news this morning shows the polar ice cap was 36 degrees warmer than it should be at this time of year. The clock is ticking and we have to act. The rooftop solar system owners are still far too few to be anything but in inconvenience to RMP. We paid them a substantial, up front fee when this house was built only 6 years ago. My husband and I have no children or grandchildren, so we are doing this to save YOUR family

The poor air quality in Utah is costly in terms of the health of those who live here. I myself suffer from asthma which becomes a significant health issue for me during the winter. There is no reason that RMP cannot figure out how to manage these systems coming on line and for all of our sakes, they have to embrace this change.

Impact To Our Community

Rocky Mountain Power's proposed rate increases will have a direct, negative impact on our community in three specific ways:

Bad for consumers – This is an unfair move by a monopoly to punish Utahns who are trying to save money via residential solar. The new rate changes will almost triple the amount of time it will take these consumers to break even on their solar investment.

Bad for air quality – This measure makes it clear that Rocky Mountain Power cares more about its own bottom line than it does for our community and the health of Utah residents. Utah has one of the worst air quality conditions in the country and solar is part of the solution.

Bad for business – This move is particularly dangerous because Utah is such a pro-business state and the residential solar industry has been one of the largest and strongest sources of job generation over the past 5 years. Given the impact this new rate increase will have on customers, the impact on solar jobs focused only on Utah customers will be devastating.

Dear PSC members:

I am writing to express my concern about the rate changes proposed by Rocky Mountain Power for net metering customers. I purchased solar panels this year, so for now, at least I would not be directly affected by the change. I think it is clear, however, that the proposed changes will remove almost all incentive to install rooftop solar, and that the state and the public will be losers in the long run. Some of the claims made by Rocky Mountain Power are simply not credible. At best they are based on averages that mask a number of important details.

Rocky Mountain Power claims that my bill is being subsidized to the amount of \$400 per year by non-solar customers. For me, that would amount to almost half of what I was paying before I installed my panels, and it suggests that half of what I was paying was not for consumption, but rather for infrastructure. If that is the case, then why aren't the bills for all customers laid out to directly charge for infrastructure?

Rocky Mountain Power's justification for peak usage charges are based on annual averages. What matters more is demand during summer, when demand is the highest. They begged me for years in install a cool keeper on my air conditioner so that they could manage peak demand on hot days. My rooftop panels cut my demand much more effectively than a cool keeper, reducing it to zero on all but the hottest days.

Rocky Mountain Power claims that solar users depend on the grid for 23.99 hours in a day. Where does that number come from? Particularly during the summer I am a net producer for most of the daylight hours. Maybe there is a surge for a second when I turn on a motor, and they count that as demand for the hour in which it occurred. The number doesn't make sense.

It would be interesting to see an analysis of how Rocky Mountain Power came up with its costs for power from solar farms. Did land purchase prices factor in? Did they consider transmission losses? Are they using the same accounting methods that they use with their fossil fuel plants?

As a person who deals with numbers for a living, I know that it is possible to pick and choose data to fit a particular point of view I am deeply distrustful of Rocky Mountain Power's motives in this case, and I think that you should be as well. They are faced with a loss of demand for their product and are acting to ensure that they control the supply.

Finally, although the decision to install solar power made sense for me under the current rules and with existing tax incentives, I was also motivated by a desire to reduce the air pollution in the intermountain west caused by the burning of fossil fuels and a desire to reduce my carbon footprint. The problems of dirty air in Utah are obvious to anyone who breathes, and as a PhD scientist, I am convinced that the threat of man made climate change is real. These external costs that are not factored into Rocky Mountain's calculations should be, and it is appropriate that the consumers of power generated by fossil fuels pay more than those relying on and generating clean power.

I hope that you will deny this request from Rocky Mountain Power and insist on a rate structure that is fair and reflects all of the costs of power production.

Hello,

I am against this proposal.

The following are my comments on docket number 14-035-114.

I have been a part of the Rocky Mountain Power (RMP) Blue Sky program since its inception, I discontinued this participation this week because of this proposal by RMP.

I find the proposal completely one sided in favor of maintaining a hold on a power system that needs to be updated. The benefits for RMP are not discussed only RMP's claimed costs. For instance, what happens to the excess electricity produced during the summer months when rates are highest and the fuel cost for the residential solar power are \$0 ??? I looked into using the RMP solar program, but found that my bill would increase even though the fuel costs for solar are zero. I understand the capital investment but this can be depreciated over 25 years.

I am currently having solar panels installed and would not be affected by this current proposal. Per an article in the SL Tribune this proposal will affect 4000 jobs in this state by effectively making residential solar a non starter for new customers.

I would recommend that a study be made of Hawaii Electric since they have the highest penetration of residential solar in the nation at ten percent of all residential customers. Hawaii Electric manages to cover costs for the \$9 fee.

I would also recommend that the committee look into national security matters for our electric grid. See www.energy.gov "Large Power Transformers and the U.S. Electric Grid" April 2014 update. In looking at Hawaii Electrics evolution, I believe they will have a more reliable and more secure power grid in the near future. This will create more jobs and help our national security. Please continue to bring Utah forward in the evolution of our national power grid by showing the nation how to evolve its power grid.

## Regarding the request for change to Net Metering Rates for Rooftop Solar Users

I have been reading the testimony of the Rocky Mountain Power and Pacificorp executives from November 9 and I would like to submit the following thoughts for consideration.

With respect to the increasing number of net metering customers, it was stated in the testimony of Gary Hoogenven that there are 16,000 net metering customers expected by the end of 2016, but that Rocky Mountain Power currently services 820,000 customers. While the number is growing based on the data he provided, the total net metering customers is <u>still</u> less than 2% of the total customer base. It would seem that these customers do not likely represent a hardship on the workload of Rocky Mountain Power.

One problem specifically raised in the testimony of Mr. Hoogenven was that the solar power is generated at off-peak hours, but the customers need to draw against their credits during peak time. Yes, the sun only shines for part of the day and therefore the solar users will always need to have some way to draw against either the grid or stored power when the panels are not generating power. He also stated that Rocky Mountain Power has been increasing their usage of solar power as well, no doubt because the cost of solar production has become so cost of fective and the raw materials are free. My point is that Rocky Mountain Power will eventually have to figure out how to store power too and that cost effective technologies for doing exactly that are rapidly becoming available. Tesla has a product that can store enough power for fairly large commercial operations. Wheeler Equipment is also working on similar systems. This technology is exciting, relatively inexpensive, and CLEAN. There is no reason why Rocky Mountain Power cannot start to make this transition as the demand for this service grows and will eventually provide energy at a rate substantially lower in cost to procure than currently available. Many of us, myself included, have helped them to do exactly that by participating in their voluntary Blue Sky program and other clean energy initiatives, many of which were created because the citizens of Utah demanded cleaner energy production. Even though Mr. Meredith testified that customers are "economically indifferent to whether or not they receive a kilowatt from a private source or some other one", I can verify that customers are not ethically indifferent. No anymore.

The per line fee rate increase from \$9.00 to \$15.00 is <u>nearly a 75% increase</u>! Those rates will be the new starting point for all customers who are net metering and will be there in perpetuity. Every single customer who is currently receiving service from Rocky Mountain Power paid a substantial up front cost to be attached to the grid. I think when we built our home about 6 years ago we paid in the neighborhood of \$10,000 per pole just to bring the power over to the house. Some of the expense has been paid up front.

In reading the testimony of Joelle Steward, she provides a graph of how the net-metering customers load rises about the same time that of regular residential customers begins to lower. Her argument is that the system can manage more consistent and flatter (smoother) trends in demand. It appears that eventually as more users come on line with net-metering and their demands become more consistent, the system will eventually achieve exactly what they are saying is easier for them to manage.

If the demand charge is implemented, you should require Rocky Mountain Power to create an easy to use app that will alert net metering customers when their usage is approaching demand charge thresholds. These apps already exist for some solar systems and should be easy to implement. Cell phone providers already send text messages to phones of users who are about to go over their data allocation. These messages are effective to help the customer make decisions about their usage and also to help the provider to have fewer angry customers who get surprised by a substantial bill they didn't expect to receive.

I do struggle a bit with the small sample size of the net metering group used to calculate the comparative costs. It is possible that these are representative customers, but it is also possible that they might have home based businesses or some other unusual circumstance that the model is not fully capturing. Not every person who has moved over to solar power production had just a regular home. They may have a shop that uses a lot of high tech equipment where they head after working their regular job, or they may have a side business that functions without them during the day. These

anomalies will skew your data. I wonder about the sample, although I can see Rocky Mountain Power made a modest effort to get a decent sampling.

My final point has to do with the assertion that costs of the net metering program result in higher rates for other customers. The costs of serving those customers are fairly easy to calculate, but the benefits to those customers and all residents of Utah are much more difficult to quantify. There is no effort made in this analysis to determine the benefits to all of society because a homeowner is choosing to produce and consume cleaner energy. I find this analysis somewhat limited in light of the poor air quality that inundates our state for a significant part of the year and that it in no way captures the health-related expenses, which can run to tens of millions of dollars. **But here is the question that has me up tonight writing this email at 3:30 am...what are you doing to save this planet?** What are you willing to do to reduce global warming? Taking a single home to solar energy can reduce the carbon load in the neighborhood of <u>10-12 tons per year</u>. It also might, just might, mean that your grandchildren will get to see a Polar Bear in their lifetime or perhaps enjoy the four seasons in Utah instead of one or two. In my mind we have not a moment to waste. The clock is ticking and time is slipping away. Please do nothing to slow or stop the growth of solar power use, and choose instead to do whatever you can to nurture it. You have so much power to assist this cause in your hands. Use it well.

RMP may be able to purchase solar energy from large solar farms for less, as they claim, but rooftop solar does not require significant transmission costs.

Solar energy provides considerable benefits to Utah, and these need to also be factored into the calculations. Homeowners purchasing a solar panel system have invested considerably to contribute to clean and sustainable energy within our community. It is shortsighted to allow RMP to focus on some but not all aspects of solar energy.

The percentage of customers that are utilizing net metering is small, and they are being unfairly targeted as a single class of customers. It could also be argued that more efficient, conservation minded customers should also be assessed additional fees, given they are not paying their fair share of grid costs. Dear Sir/Ma'am,

As a home owner who installed rooftop solar three years ago I certainly have a bias and admit to it. I would say though that what led me to look at solar power was the poor air quality we had the previous winter and my daughter's trouble breathing due to her asthma. For me, that was the biggest factor in my decision to try to do my part to clear the air a little. I do not see that positive benefit being considered in any of RMP's proposals. I would hope you consider that as part of the renewable energy policy in the state.

That said, I understand the shift to renewables could be a burden on RMP's gird at some point many, many years in the future at the pace we moving. So I agree with adjustments and fees for people that have made the choice to move to rooftop solar. However, they should be reasonable and balanced. For example, my panels are only generating 2.1kW of power which is about half of my usage, so I still support the "traditional" grid and would be over-penalized under RMP's proposed plan. Again, I am fine with a minor increase in fees to keep the grid supported for all Utah consumers.

My concern is the three tiered approach by RMP seems to be an incredibly aggressive "power grab." It looks to me like they are putting three major fees out there hoping one will get through committee, because even one of them is higher than prior proposals. The flat fee is an example of that. If I remember correctly they asked for a \$5 increase a while back and they are asking for \$9 now, PLUS a peak charge, PLUS a higher rate for grid power.

Personally I believe a flat fee increase probably is needed and a reasonable one supported with data would be fine. The other two fees would place an additional and unneeded burden on solar users and could kill the industry. For me personally, since I only generate part of my needs through solar, I would actually lose money every month under their new proposals because I currently use grid power for half our needs. I would have to shut down my panels to avoid losing money every month. That is not what we need.

Use of solar panels provides a clean way to convert energy from the sun into electricity. Solar electricity generation is one of the few low-carbon energy technologies with the potential to grow to large scale. Several benefits are immediately obvious. The sun provides unlimited energy that has been used for millions of years to produce green plants. Sunlight is free. With the advent of modern physics, chemistry, and engineering during the past century, clever individuals have discovered how to convert sunlight into electricity using readily available chemical elements. In the past few years, this discovery has been commercialized and is now the basis for a rapidly growing global enterprise that has the promise over the next few decades of providing electricity to a wide variety of users ranging from homeowners to large businesses at competitive rates. Today, it is estimated by the Solar Energy Industries Association that the U.S. solar industry employs 174,000 Americans and pumps nearly \$18 billion per year into our economy.

Advantages of solar energy for electricity production are many. Solar panels can be used for small installations such as homes or for large buildings. A solar inverter is used to convert direct current output into alternating current for use by the energy off-taker. Most installations are tied to regulated electric utility industries, but it is possible to make the operation independent by using rechargeable batteries. The system is simple with no need for extensive transmission lines from commercial coal, natural gas, or nuclear electric power generating plants to the user. Secondary effects encountered with the use of coal, natural gas, or radionuclides to power these plants, such as environmental pollution and negative human health issues are eliminated. This is a tremendous benefit, especially in developing countries, since waste generated in mining, processing, and using these resources is large and expensive to treat, if treated at all.

Use of green technologies, such as solar panels, is increasing on a global scale. Western Europe, China, and India are prime movers in this effort. The population of India is over one billion. Of these, about 300 million do not have access to electricity. This number is equal to the population of the United States. India has embarked on a program of installing solar panels on rooftops and setting up massive solar parks. This effort is expected to catapult India to the forefront of the global effort to bring electricity to all. An immediate benefit is the decreased need to build electric power generating plants to provide this electricity.

Some experts predict that by 2050 a major fraction of the world's power should come from solar sources. However, getting to this point will require real and dedicated cooperation among stakeholders including users; providers; local, State, and National legislators and policy makers; and utilities. Many important and controversial issues need to be considered and workable solutions found.

The long-term potential of solar power to meet a significant portion of global electricity demand is assured. It is imperative that stakeholders work together to identify and solve problems. Individuals in the U.S. should be leading this field, not putting impediments in its path.

It is fair that all customers that are connected to the grid should pay RMP for their connection to the grid and option to draw powder from the grid (whether they do so or not). connection fee ensures that all customers that connect to the grid share in the cost for maintenance of the distribution infrastrudtuiseclear that RMP wishes to cover these costs but they have gone way beyond this approach in their request.

Maintenance of the distribution system is a relatively fixed cost so the price to consumers should not be varia calculated on a "peak usage" formulan fact a better way to approach this situation would be to have RMP distinguish between their costs for power generation and power distributions as these costs are combined a proper calculation of costs for only their distribution system cannot be accurately calculated.

In case the Commission chooses to include consideration of "peak usage" in Net Metering agreements them R analysis should be revised such that all customers share the burden of demand the peak power usage – not just residential solar system operators.

Thank you very much for your consideration of these comments ope that the Commission will take its time to fully evaluate these applications and seek further public input before making final decisions.

I am writing to express my concern over RMP's proposed changes to net metering. I think it is a greedy and selfish act on the part of RMP. They frequently advertise that they are a green energy company and support alternative energy production, but only when it is profitable to them. An example of this is their Blue Sky Program. This is simply a money making scheme to make them look like they are environmentally friendly. Would they have this program if there weren't incentives or profit for them? No. RMP does not have the best interest of Utah and its citizens in mind. For example, look at the last minute deal struck by RMP and the Utah legislature last session. This was an underhanded deal that never should have passed.

As you know, our winter air quality is awful. We should be doing every little thing we can to improve it. Increasing fees for net metering is not a good way to promote clean air in Utah. I do not feel bad for RMP at all. It's clear the clean energy is growing in Utah and can potentially have a significant impact on carbon emissions. If RMP can't change to accommodate the future, then maybe they should give up their monopoly, leave Utah, and make room for and energy company that can think past coal.

I have a PV at my house. Why doesn't the legislature and Public Service Commission make RMP pay me for excess power I put into the system?? I have had my PV system for 3 years and each year I have put more into the system than I've used. I realistically don't expect to get paid for this excess, but I also have the expectation that I not be penalized for having a rooftop PV system. And yes, I think asking home PV customers to pay increased fees is a penalty . If RMP continues to go after net metered customers, they will lose my business. I am currently getting quotes for a battery system with a natural gas generator. I know this isn't feasible for all net metered customers right now, but the technology will get better and cheaper and RMP will lose more people as it does.

I urge you NOT to support any proposal by RMP that negatively affects customers with home PV system and net metering in Utah.

Dear Commissioners,

Please do not approve the filing by Rocky Mountain Power for changes to the Net Metering tariffs and fee schedules. The proposed schedules for new renewables connections will decimate the Utah solar and renewables industry. Please schedule Public Hearings so that this issue can be fully discussed and the intended and unintended consequences identified and addressed.

As the owner of a current roof top solar house we have access to ACTUAL DATA that shows the benefits of solar, and allows us to understand the estimated bills that we would experience if we were subject to the demand charges under the proposed Schedule 5. RMP has asserted that the average net metering customers demand peaks at 1.6 KW. We believe this is incorrect based on the data we are collecting. We believe the actual maximum demand to be 4 to 7 KW for a house with electric appliances. This would rise to 11 to 14 KW for houses with an electric vehicle. Our zero emission geothermal HVAC system heats our house with heat energy stored in the ground, but recovered through an electric heat pump system. We have solar panels to drive this system.

Our house, which is approximately "net zero" on an annual basis for all heating and other energy uses, would go from a monthly electric bill of \$8.50 to a bill of \$30 to \$65 per month. This bill would increase to \$115 to \$145 / month if we purchased an electric car.

In other words this filing has the potential to shut down not just the roof top solar industry, but also the electric car transition for those houses with solar – the group most likely to buy electric vehicles. We NEED these vehicles to be purchased broadly to address the air quality concerns in the Salt Lake Valley.

Please reject this filing and schedule public hearings,

Dear Public Service Commissioners,

Please reject Rocky Mountain Power's (RMP) request to assess new fees to net metering customers. The argument presented in their request is invalid, and I believe they intend to prevent competition, rather than ensure fairness.

In section B (page 13) of UT 14-035-114 RMP ComplianceFiling (11-9-16), RMP asserts the following:

This solar generation often does not coincide with the Company's peak load, thus only minimally reducing that load. Company witness Mr. Marx testifies that a net metering customer 's peak production occurs during the spring months while their peak load, and that of other customers, occurs during the summer months. These factors necessitate increasing the size of the distribution facilities as a result of net metering.

The conclusion drawn in that last statement is false. After admitting that solar generation reduces the load on their grid, RMP cannot then claim this causes them to increase the size of their distribution facilities. Even if the peak generation and peak demand are not perfectly synchronized, a very strong correlation exists between when the sun is shining and when air conditioners are running the summer time. Therefore, RMP experiences an actual reduction in peak demand due to net metering customers.

Additionally, excess power from net metering customers can typically be transported to a nearby customer, unlike power from RMP's power plants that travels hundreds of miles. So rather than building costly grid infrastructure that loses efficiency over long distances, net metering customers can utilize existing infrastructure within their own neighborhood. This extends the life of the system's capacity, resulting in a reduction in the need for additional distribution facilities.

Net metering customers should not be punished for reducing the power load at peak demand. The three-part rate structure RMP proposed is intended to make investing in photovoltaic solar so costly that residents would pay significantly more for solar than to utilize RMP's coal-generated power. Because RMP's corporate hierarchy also includes coal mining and distribution, this request appears to be aimed at protecting the supply chain of their existing monopoly , rather than doing what's right for customers and communities.

Recognizing a long-term need for cleaner, sustainable energy, Federal and State legislators have for several years ofered tax incentives to make solar more affordable. RMP's proposed rate structure would effectively funnel all these subsidies (and more) back into their own business, which is heavily dependent on pollutive coal technology.

I understand RMP is a business, and their shareholders expect to profit from their operations, but their request is dangerously anti-competitive, anti-consumer, and further threatens the already poor air quality in Utah. Please reject their
