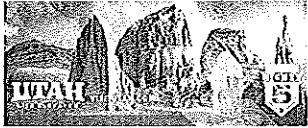

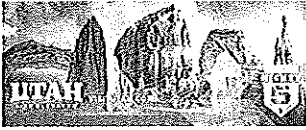

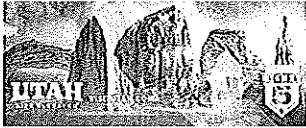

As a RMP customer and a resident of the Salt Lake Valley, I am writing to express my disappointment and despair upon reviewing the company's integrated resource plan.

We must STOP deciding energy policy on the basis of short term profit considerations. The public utility has a broader mandate to protect the interests of its constituency. The continued over-reliance on COAL based electricity generation is indefensible in the face of well established and extremely costly environmental, health and economic effects.

While COAL may be the easiest short term way to keep the price per kWh of electricity we see on our electric bills to a minimum, the actual price we are paying for every additional ton of coal burned is much greater. The long and short term health effects of coal related pollution create a tremendous burden on our public health budget, not to mention the human toll. As taxpayers, we are subsidizing RMP's profits by footing the bill for the health care expenses that result directly from burning coal. If those costs were reflected in the price we pay for Coal based electricity, we would realize it is no bargain.

And when Utah's economy suffers because companies move elsewhere due to air quality concerns, where does that come into the equation? Not to mention all the negative impact on our basic quality of life related to noxious coal burning.

At this point in history we should be aggressively dismantling our Coal burning infrastructure and transitioning to the renewable, sustainable sources that will power our future. They are viable and inevitable. Why would we want to drag our feet and miss out on all the good jobs and other economic benefits that will accrue the sooner we start?

On my roof, I am proud to have over 8kW worth of PV capacity. The choice to install was an easy one - even at RMP's massively subsidized rates, the investment will pay itself off within 10 - 15 years. I drive my electric car and meet all my residential electricity needs without contributing to our critical pollution problem. With the right policies in place, most everyone could afford to do what I have, and life in SLC would benefit immeasurably.

Instead of their petty attempts to discourage further decentralized/small-scale solar installations, RMP should rather be doing everything in its power to incentivize and encourage it.

At the same time RMP should immediately take its most egregiously outdated coal burning plants off-line and move quickly convert its most efficient ones to the burning of natural gas.

Until the price of Coal accurately reflects all of its inherent societal costs, the misguided and erroneous basis for documents like RMP's Integrated Resource Plan will remain obscured.
