With Regard to Rocky Mountain Power's Integrated Resource Plan. August 2015.

It seems to me absurd that RMP's IRP fails to project any significant move towards expanding Renewable Energy harvests.

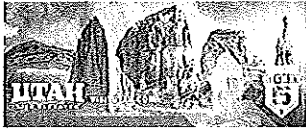

Dear Public Utilities Commission members:

My comments for your consideration in the matter of Docket No. 15-035-04: I have been attentive to this matter for some time, being Natural Resources Director for League of Women Voters of Salt Lake for six + years, retiring this summer; and being a board member of Breathe Utah. I previously commented to you in person in the matter of net metering and Rocky Mountain Power, about a year and a half ago.

The State of Utah has very high renewable energy potential. The EPA is moving heaven and earth to stop and/or clean up coal burning and its emissions, and Utah has a serious air quality problem; if we have bad air this winter we will automatically qualify for "serious nonconforming" status. I think you must not allow Rocky Mountain Power to make a longterm commitment to coal.

I don't know why Rocky Mountain Power (RMP) thinks continuing to burn coal in Utah "forever" is possible. The United States Bureau of Land Management has just closed comments regarding expansion of the coal strip mining operation that exclusively supplies one of RMP's oldest plants (decision not announced yet). The coal is of low quality, the demand for it abroad is down by more than 20-30%; this cheap coal may not be available.

According to their application, RMP is not planning on building any new renewables in its 20-year plan, even though more regulation of coal burning is entirely predictable, and the costs for fees and pollution controls will continue to increase, with concurrent increases in electricity costs to us consumers. Since their biggest customer, California, no longer wants coal generated power, I fear RMP is planning to take advantage of Utah's loose policies and use their old but existing facilities to our disadvantage.

I propose a readily implementable alternative: As one of their customers, I received a poll asking if we liked the idea of "community solar." That means small generating facilities located nearby (as opposed to large array facilities located remotely, usually in the desert). Here on the Wasatch Front, the heaviest energy using region in the state, we have plenty of space for community solar, including many correctly-orient rooftops available for their convenience. If they would install their own solar and maintain the units themselves, collecting community energy would be extremely easy and cost-effective here. Because of the density of available rooftops and proximity to their own lines, maintenance would also be relatively easy.

I am not advocating doing away with the coal generation plants completely or immediately, but I do strongly advocate for at least a 50-50 split between renewables and fossil fuels. If you find that impossible, then a forced conversion to natural gas burning for energy production is "less terrible" than RMP's current scenario.

Thank you for considering my opinion, and for taking public comment.
