I purchased my solar system based on some pretty tight calculations. My system just breaks even over the payof f period of about 15 years. If the Rocky Mountain Power proposal were to be imposed on me, this would in effect be an ex post facto tax on my system that would have completely blown the economies of f the scale, making it unfeasible.

While I can understand RMP's concerns, to go back on current arrangements with current solar installations would cause me, and certainly other solar customers, significant hardship.

In addition I feel that the RMP proposal is somewhat hypocritical as they are touting their OWN solar program. Are they going to impose these fees on THOSE customers? Obviously they felt there was a market to be had there, as they have jumped in with both feet.

In short, this appears to be an attempted monopolistic money grab out of fear of lost business. The additional costs of installation are borne by those that install the solar systems, and RMP actually stands to get additional power during peak usage times at extraordinary rates from solar customers. Dear Commissioners,

I am strongly opposed to PacifiCorp-RMP's Advice No. 16-13, filed Nov. 9, 2016, to penalize solar customers for following their government's suggestions to reduce dependence on fossil fuels. As the watchdog over Public Utilities and the only protection the public has against powerful monopolies, which is the very reason for the existence of the PSC, you should unequivocally deny this fast track request and the shortened public comment period. This smells fishy to say the least. You seem like you are on the side of the utility thereby leaving we customers exposed. For what purpose then do we have a Public Service Commission?

I have read some of the voluminous exhibits and I believe that the real issues are not as stated, the cost of applications, the revamping of the grid, the theft of money by the solar customers from regular customers, etc.. All these are bogus arguments. Automating applications, longer term grid planning (although the impact even in the future is negligible), and who knows where the last theft augment came from. Leaving a vacation home empty for most of a year has essentially the same impact as a solar customer producing some of his own electricity. And it appears that some power is purchased and produced by the utility using wind generation AND solar. So they can

do it but a very small percentage of residential customers can't. Explain the logic in that!

The real issue is NOT global warming or saving the environment. You can sit on either side of that issue. Nor does it have anything to do with a utility's inconvenience or small money issues. Whether or not you believe the reduction of fossil fuels is necessary, is another issue.

The real issue is fairness. Fairness to those of us who have been suckered into investing tens of thousands of dollars (\$43,000 in my case) on hopes and promises made by our government and our utilities.

The government, both state and federal, have encouraged the generation of clean energy and the reduction of fossil fuel energy.

As proof, both the state and federal governments give generous subsidies to encourage the public to invest large sums of money in wind and solar to generate a measly fraction of a percent of the overall capacity of the system. Utitilies encourage energy saving devices and diligence in using electricity. They suggest changing out inefficient lighting, also at huge expense. All for the purpose of saving electricity...which is contrary to the purpose of an electric utility...which is to sell lots of electricity.

And why does the government do this? They say it is for the "greater good of the nation". That may or may not be true. But again it is not the issue. They decided on this course and are encouraging the consumer to go along. They know that it is expensive for the homeowner and that the utility may not like it, but the government continues its relentless drive.

So to have that same government penalize the very people they are trying to incentivize is not only unfair but borders on criminal.

Then to have a designated consumer protection agency even consider changes that are contrary to the stated, advertised, and promoted desires of that same government is the reason we have lost faith in our government...It is unconscionable behavior.

So, instead of fast tracking, limited comment and the appearance of collusion, you as a Public Service Commission should start standing on the side of the consumer, whom you are paid to serve, and automatically reject any proposal, rate increase, etc. that is contrary to your own government's stated objectives. You should give solar customers a Hi Five and give them MORE incentive.

Or, you can do what you are doing now. Just tell us up front that we are suckers and you want us to spend large amounts of money and promise us wonderful returns. Just like they did in Nevada. (And it doesn't look good for the PSC of that state after this last election.) But also tell us that it is a scam and we will be penalized later and will lose our investments and will be hassled because we tried to do what we thought our government wanted us to

do...for the sake of the "greater good". Yep, that is why we rose up this last election and threw out the bureaucrats with their fat pensions.

I was going to stop here, but just yesterday learned of a tragic statement made in a public interview of Mr.Gary Hoogeveen, Rocky Mountain Power senior vice-president. I could not believe that someone in his position would be allowed to make such a statement.

"Customers partially relying on renewable energy through the net-metering program **must still pay their fair share** of the costs to serve them."

How deceptive and divisive. Class warfare? Do I live in Russia?

Does a widow living on Social Security and using the very minimum electricity she can afford "not paying her fair share"? If Rocky Mountain Power's proposal is approved, and those rates applied to me, my monthly charges would not only exceed what I currently pay monthly, but would significantly exceed the amount I paid even before I had solar panels, making it so expensive to use the solar power that I produce that I would have to return to getting all of my electricity off the grid, disabling the solar system I just installed. What a discouraging loss of what seemed to me to be a win/win investment a year and a half ago.

When I had my solar system installed, I looked forward to saving money over the long haul and believed that I was doing something good for the environment. I live in Sandy Utah, where winter inversions contribute to terrible air quality. Solar energy is a clean source of energy. We all need to do what we can to improve Utah's air quality, and rooftop solar power should be a part of a multi-faceted solution to the problem. Rocky Mountain Power's proposal would discourage people like me from taking the step toward using this clean power source.

I hope that you will reject Advice No.16-13 and allow individuals like myself to continue to install and use rooftop solar systems, which require a significant initial investment, at af fordable rates to help improve Utah's air quality.

I currently have solar on my house and will therefore be grandfathered on the current rate structures, but my concern is that once they can marginalize/trivialize the power the customer is generating and providing to the grid in general, the more easily they can modify the credits and rate tiers for existing solar customers. As soon as this passes and creates precedence, the grandfathered customers will be gone after for "not paying their fair share." The subsidy argument doesn't make complete sense either. All solar customers who do not generate 100% of their power still pay per kWh hour rates. Is the margin inside these rates still not going to poles and system infrastructure?

I can understand that hind sight is 20/20 and adjustments need to be made as programs go along, but normalizing the rates/fees to "make it fair" for everyone else is a contradiction. Why should the "everyone else" get a break on the backs of the private solar customers who have put some investment into the energy generation. Is there some magic break even number of kWh usage that they are normalizing to? In RMP's 1000 kWh example in which half is generated from solar they are indicating 500 kWh payable by the customer isn't enough to support the infrastructure. What of the homes and apartments who only use 500 kWh regularly. Are we to say we should "fine" them as well to make up for the others? We certainly can't say that solar isn't a positive to the infrastructure and the power generated or RMP and others wouldn't be building and leveraging such large solar farms. So the solar itself doesn't appear to be the issue.

I do believe this will be a detriment to the community as it will definitely have an impact on those willing to put up private solar. The argument of saving 52% versus still saving 35% is substantial. The argument that 35% is still a great number to save is still at that tipping point where more often I do not believe people will go through the effort/pain for that number. And this impacts many things: jobs, environment, air quality, personal commitment to being greener.

Again, I have solar already and thankfully will be grandfathered in (for the time being), but something just doesn't feel right with this. The "making up for everyone else not doing solar" just doesn't make sense to me. I have been through RMP's site that discusses all this, but that doesn't resonate as the fact of it either . I may have to break down and read the 400 page doc to see if that gives the details and the data to net this out.

I appreciate being able to participate in this discussion, even if just through an email submission. I'd be happy to talk further if needed.

Dear Commissioners,

I would like to express my desire that the Public Service Commission **not approve** Rocky Mountain Power's request in the above referenced filing. In support for my request I provide the following information:

- 1. In response to strong federal and state requests that we reduce air pollution, especially here in Utah, I began considering solar energy for my home earlier this year and made a final decision only a few weeks ago.
- 2. I must stabilize my costs of living expenses. I've been retired for 15+ years with only slight Social Security annual increases to cover ever-increasing costs of living and utility expenses. On October 31, 2016, after extensive research, reviewing numerous vender proposals, and talking with solar system sales representatives, I signed a contract for the installation of 6.54kW of solar power for my home in Orem. 6.54kW is more than my current requirements and greater than was specified by any solar company seeking my business. However, I wanted to cover my current maximum electrical requirements and felt that if I returned some surplus electricity to RMP's grid that could support grid requirements and my neighbors, the higher initial up-front costs would be worth it.
- 3. I learned just last week about Rocky Mounty Power's (RMP) filing for a change in their Net Metering program with its higher costs (and/or the probability of higher rates to residential customers, without PSC approval). Upon learning of this filing I was greatly disappointed and disturbed. Disappointed that RMP was filing a tariff that would negatively impact the solar industry in Utah and slow down or reduce solar installations apparently against requests from Governor Herbert that we reduce dangerous emissions. Disturbed that my costs, which I'm trying to management as best I can, will be out of my control and negatively impacted even after a sizeable initial outlay of cash to acquire and install a solar system.
- 4. I understand that RMP has requested a cut-off of November 22, 2016 for public comments, such as mine. However, after contacting your office I understand my comments would be appreciated, even if received later than November 22. Such a short period for comments seems unreasonable, unless RMP is trying to slip something by the PSC or their solar net metering customers. Why the rush?? If their need is legitimate, is there not an established process that RMP should be following to request changes in their tariffs, policies and rates.
- 5. It appears to me, from what I have studied and learned about residential solar energy that I will be taking on more responsibility in having electrical energy to support my home and family. My increased workload/involvement should result in reduced work for RMP and its employees. If anything, RMP should be seeking ways to encourage rooftop solar systems instead of discouraging them through tariff changes and higher, complicated rate structures.

I appreciate the opportunity of presenting my thoughts on residential solar energy and how this tariff filing impacts me and my family. I believe solar energy should be on the mind of all home owners and property developers. Rocky Mountain Power should be looking for ways to embrace the generation of residential and business solar energy by owner investment, rather than discouraging its development.
