3	COMMISSIONER LEVAR: Okay. Good evening. We
4	are here for the public comment hearing in Public Service
5	Commission Docket 20-35-4, application of Rocky Mountain
6	Power for authority to increase its retail electric
7	utility service rates in Utah and for approval of its
8	proposed electric service schedules and electric service
9	regulations.
10	I'm Thad LeVar, and the other two
11	Commissioners are on the meeting, Commissioner David
12	Clark and Commissioner Ron Allen. And this is the
13	opportunity for members of the public to provide comment
14	on this proposed rate increase by Rocky Mountain Power.
15	At this point, Mr. Darnell, you are the only
16	person who has signed up to provide comments to us this
17	afternoon, so we will turn the floor over to you to tell
18	us what you could like to tell us what you would like
19	to talk about.
20	MR. CHARLES DARNELL: Thank you very much.
21	I'm surprised I'm the only one, but that will be just
22	fine.
23	My name is Charles Darnell. I'm currently
24	the associate vice president for energy management and
25	sustainability at the university, at Utah State

1 University. 2 I have over 42 years of experience in 3 facilities and utility management at state universities 4 in Texas, Illinois and Utah. Over the past year, I have worked 5 6 independently in part of -- and also as part of a virus collision, to procure renewable power under PacifiCorp's 7 Rate 34 and 32 on behalf of Utah State University. 8 The university is a 2007 signatory of the 9 10 President's climate commitment, pledging the institute to 11 become carbon neutral by the year 2050. 12 In 2019, the university adopted a faculty 13 Senate resolution to accelerate its prior carbon 14 neutrality pledge to the year 2040. My impression of the procurement process and the increasing costs to 15 16 participate in these tariffs is that PacifiCorp prepares 17 to be systematically attempting to make its green tariffs 18 economically inaccessible to customers like Utah State 19 University. 20 From PacifiCorp providing the issue seemingly arbitrary avoided cost under Rate 34 to its current 21 22 request for higher component charges on Rate 32, the 23 Company's actions threaten to render these rates 24 uneconomical to the very customers who are intended to 25 take advantage of them.

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1	Like the University of Utah, many state	
2	universities, including Utah State and Utah businesses,	
3	have a greater sense of urgency to reduce carbon	
4	emissions than would be achieved through PacifiCorp's	
5	current integrated resource plan.	
б	There should be no reason why PacifiCorp and	
7	its large customers cannot be working simultaneously	
8	toward more expedient carbon reduction, through	
9	utilization of Rates 34 and 32.	
10	For this reason, I encourage the Public	
11	Service Commission to reject PacifiCorp's request for	
12	changes in Rate 32 so that organizations like Utah State	
13	University and others can have straightforward access to	
14	stable and fairly priced green tariffs in the state of	
15	Utah.	
16	This concludes my witness statement. Thank	
17	you.	
18	COMMISSIONER LEVAR: Thank you, Mr. Darnell.	
19	I will just check and see if Commission Allen or	
20	Commissioner Clark have any questions for you.	
21	COMMISSIONER ALLEN: I have no questions.	
22	Thank you, though, for your testimony.	
23	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yes. Mr. Darnell, thank	
24	you for taking the time. We appreciate your message.	
25	THE WITNESS: Well, thank you very much for	

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1	accepting it. I appreciate that. And have a good
2	evening.
3	COMMISSIONER LEVAR: Thank you. You too.
4	Thank you for taking your time to speak with us today.
5	And let me just ask if anyone else on this
6	video conference has anything else we should consider
