Conference in Docket No. 10-057-12 In the Matter of the Consideration of the Various Rate Design Issues, Cost of Service Issues and Other Issues

Pursuant to the Settlement Stipulation in Docket No. 09-057-16.

Discussion:

The following are some of the issues the Division sees as pertinent to the upcoming Technical Conference:

Issue 1- Definition of Rate Classes:

- 1. Should the GS Rate Class be split into a single family residential/multi-family residential/ and perhaps several commercial classes?
- 2. Should rate classes be further defined within the above categories by Basic Service fee, as determined primarily by meter size?
- 3. Should either the total GS rate or the separate residential and commercial classes be split into volumetric "silos" based on maximum monthly loads?

Issue 2- Distribution Plant Factor Study

1. Currently based on sample data of 1660 meters including all meters serving the largest customers. Division believes this needs updating and refinement.



- Current study 4 years old.
- Calculation of costs per customer should be computed on basis of numbers of customers not services on sampled mains?
- What is the appropriate length of distribution main to include in cost allocation determination?

Issue 3- Other Allocation Issues

- 1. Is the distribution plant factor study appropriate to allocate O&M and G&A expenses?
- 2. How should the Peak Day Factor be determined, esp. for interruptible customers?

Issue 4 – Rate Design

- 1. Are Declining/Inclining block rate structures appropriate for certain rate classes?
- 2. What is the appropriate level of Basic Service Fee (BSF) in all rate classes?
