3	JUDGE JOHNSON: For the record, today is
4	October 19th, 2016. It is just after 10:30 in the
5	morning. This is the date and time set for the hearing
6	In the Matter of a Notice Submitted by Sprint
7	Corporation, Virgin Mobile USA, L.P., and i-wireless,
8	LLC, Regarding Proposed Wireless Lifeline Services
9	Partnership and related transaction.
10	The docket numbers are 16-094-01 and
11	16-2526-01. We are expediting this hearing in order to
12	avoid delaying closing of the transaction.
13	All right. Let's get appearances on the
14	record. For the parties to the transaction.
15	MS. BERTELSEN: Good morning, your Honor. My
16	name is Sharon Bertelsen, Utah Bar No. 9759, appearing
17	on behalf of Sprint Corporation and Virgin Mobile USA,
18	L.P. I have with me today on the phone Ken Schifman,
19	senior counsel and director of state government affairs
20	at Sprint Corporation. And he will be testifying for
21	Sprint and Virgin Mobile. We also have representatives
22	from Sprint, including Virgin Mobile and i-wireless, on
23	the phone ready to address any questions that may arise
24	during the hearing.
25	We have Elaine Divelbliss, senior counsel for

Page 4 Sprint Corporation primarily responsible for their 1 2 prepay business; Kristin Jacobson, counsel, west region 3 for Sprint Corporation, including Utah; Eric Schimpf, 4 director of business development at i-wireless, LLC, responsible for operations; and Josh Guyan, outside 5 counsel to i-wireless primarily responsible for FCC 6 matters and this transaction. 7 JUDGE JONSSON: Thank you. And for the 8 9 division. 10 MR. JETTER: Good morning. I am Justin Jetter 11 with the Utah Attorney General's office, and I am here 12 today representing the Utah Division of Public 13 Utilities, and with me at counsel table is Casey Coleman with the Utah Division of Public Utilities. 14 15 JUDGE JONSSON: Thank you. Now, those of you who are on the phone, if at any point you can't hear 16 what's happening, let me know, and we'll have people 17 18 come right up here and speak into the phone. Everybody 19 okay? 2.0 MR. SCHIFMAN: Thank you, Judge. 21 JUDGE JONSSON: Okay. Very good. 2.2 Ms. Bertelsen, would you begin then and summarize the transactions for us, and then you can call your witness. 23 24 Or if you want your witness to summarize, that's fine. 25

Okay. That will be great.

MS. BERTELSEN:

Page 5 Ken is prepared. I should say Mr. Schifman. 1 2 JUDGE JONSSON: Yeah. So let's just -- we're somewhat informal, but Mr. Schifman, do you swear to 3 4 tell the truth today? 5 THE WITNESS: I do, your Honor. 6 JUDGE JONSSON: Thank you. Go ahead. 7 MS. BERTELSEN: Thank you, your Honor. 8 KEN SCHIFMAN, 9 called as a witness at the instance of the applicant, having been first duly sworn, was examined and testified 10 11 as follows: 12 DIRECT EXAMINATION 13 BY MS. BERTELSEN: Mr. Schifman, will you please state your name 14 and title. 15 16 Sharon, can you get a little closer to the Α. microphone? That would be helpful. 17 18 JUDGE JONSSON: Come join me up here. 19 MS. BERTELSEN: Thank you. 20 (By Ms. Bertelsen) Would you please state your Q. 21 name, title, business address and employer for the 22 record. 23 Yes. My name is Ken Schifman, S-C-H-I-F-M-A-N. My position is senior counsel and 24 director for Sprint Corporation. I am employed by a 25

Page 6 subsidiary of Sprint Corporation called Sprint United

- 2 Management. My business address is 6450 Sprint Parkway,
- 3 Overland Park, Kansas, 66251.
- 4 Q. And what parties are you representing today?
- 5 A. I am representing Sprint Corporation and
- 6 Virgin Mobile, USA, comma, L.P.
- 7 Q. Are you authorized to testify as a witness on
- 8 behalf of those parties?
- 9 A. Yes, I am.
- 10 Q. Do you have personal knowledge of the facts
- 11 you are going to testify to today?
- 12 A. I do.

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- 13 Q. And have you reviewed the letter notification
- 14 that was filed by the parties with the commission on
- 15 September 12th, 2016?
- 16 A. I have.
- 17 Q. Except for the updates on customer accounts
- 18 and communications, are the factual statements in the
- 19 letter correct?
- 20 A. Yes. They are accurate.
- 21 O. If asked to testify about the factual
- 22 statements in the letter, would these statements be your
- 23 testimony today?
- 24 A. Yes.
- 25 Q. Will you please describe the parties to the

### Page 7 transaction and the Lifeline customer accounts in Utah? 1 2 Α. Sure. So the parties to the transaction are i-wireless, LLC. That is a wireless service company 3 4 that utilizes Sprint for its net -- the Sprint network for its services to customers. In essence in the 5 industry it's called an MVNO of Sprint. So it utilizes 6 our network to provide services. 7 I-wireless, LLC, is headquartered in Newport, 8 9 Kentucky. It is -- has been designated as a wireless-eligible telecommunications carrier in 39 10 11 states plus the District of Columbia. I-wireless was 12 designated as a wireless-eligible telecom carrier in 13 Utah on June 29, 2011 in Docket 10-2526-1. The Lifeline brand that i-wireless utilized to 14 market its services is called Access Wireless, and the 15 customer account that we have as most recent as of 16 17 October 17 is 637 Lifeline customers in Utah for i-wireless, LLC. 18 19 Virgin Mobile, USA, comma, L.P., is also a 20 party to this transaction. It is a indirect, wholly 21 owned subsidiary of Sprint Corporation. It is 22 headquartered in Overland Park, Kansas. Virgin Mobile has been designated as a wireless-eligible telecom 23 24 carrier in 41 states plus the district of Columbia. 25 The Lifeline brand that Virgin Mobile markets

- 1 its Lifeline services under is called Assurance
- 2 Wireless. And Virgin Mobile USA was designated has a
- 3 wireless-eligible telecom carrier in Utah on May 25,
- 4 2011, Docket 10-2521-01.
- 5 And the updated customer account for the
- 6 Virgin Mobile USA as of October 17 is 2,563 Lifeline
- 7 customers in the state of Utah.
- 8 Q. Mr. Schifman, will you please describe this
- 9 transaction and the customer offerings following the
- 10 transaction?
- 11 A. Sure. On April 29, 2016, an agreement was
- 12 entered into between Sprint and i-wireless, LLC. And
- 13 Virgin Mobile was a party to the agreement as well. The
- 14 transaction consisted of two main elements. The first
- one is the transfer of the majority interest of
- 16 i-wireless, LLC, to Sprint Corporation. That's so after
- 17 the transaction closes, Sprint Corporation will own 70
- 18 percent of i-wireless, LLC. And the remaining 30
- 19 percent of i-wireless will continue to be owned by the
- 20 Kroger Company in Genie Global, Inc.
- 21 We provided exhibits regarding the corporate
- 22 transaction and charge demonstrating the ownership
- 23 structure pretransaction for i-wireless, pretransaction
- 24 for Sprint Corporation and Virgin Mobile and then
- 25 post-transaction for the combined companies. Those are

Page 9 in Exhibits A, B and D respectively. 1 2 The second element of the transaction is the 3 assignment of Virgin Mobile's Assurance Wireless branded 4 Lifeline customers to i-wireless. Once the transaction closes, Assurance Wireless customers will be transferred 5 to i-wireless operating over periods of time to ensure a 6 smooth transition to i-wireless. Paul McAleese, the CEO 7 of i-wireless, will the run the Lifeline business of the 8 9 combined companies. You also asked about the customer offers that 10 11 will be provided to the Lifeline customers following the 12 transition. Assurance Wireless customers will 13 transition from now receiving 353 voice minutes plus 14 unlimited text, text messages to an offer of 500 free 15 voice minutes, plus unlimited text messages, plus 50 megabytes of data. 16 17 The i-wireless customers, which now receive 253 voice minutes and unlimited text messages, will be 18

253 voice minutes and unlimited text messages, will be
provided a plan of the same as it is going to apply to
the Assurance Wireless customers of 500 free voice
minutes, plus unlimited text messages, plus 50 megabytes
of data. So when the transition occurs, both the
customers of Assurance Wireless and of i-wireless will
have increased voice minutes and plus 50 megabytes of
data.

Page 10 (By Ms. Bertelsen) Thank you. The letter 1 0. 2 notification states that Virgin Mobile will assign its Assurance Wireless Lifeline customer base to i-wireless 3 4 and that advanced notice of the assignment will be provided to the customers. Will you please provide an 5 update and explain how you have communicated with the 6 Assurance Wireless customer base regarding the 7 transaction? 8 9 So the letter described that Yes. notifications will be sent out to the Assurance Wireless 10 11 customers. And we in fact did make those communications 12 between the dates of September 1st and September 6th. 13 Those communications consisted of the items that we list in Exhibit D of the notification letter. 14 15 And so what happened between September 1 and September 6 is that the customers of Assurance Wireless 16 17 received a text message that had what is called in the industry a W-A-P landing page, a WAP landing page. 18 19 the text message described the transaction of merging 2.0 the Lifeline operations of Assurance Wireless and Access 21 Wireless. 22 It stated that there was no action required by 23 the customer. They would be able to keep their same 24 telephone and same telephone number. Also, the

customers received notice that they would receive as

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Page 11 many or more free minutes and text messages that they 1 2 currently receive and that they also would be receiving 3 more information to come when the -- when their account is transferred over to i-wireless. 4 In addition to the text message with the WAP 5 landing page, Assurance Wireless -- also contained in 6 7 that text message was a telephone number that the customers could call. It's a toll-free number. So once 8 9 those customers called the toll-free number, they would 10 be connected to an interactive voice response unit that 11 would -- that provided the same information that I just 12 summarized earlier. 13 Other methods of communication included the same type of messaging on the Access Wireless website 14 15 and also on the Assurance Wireless Facebook page. So 16 those messages, the initial text messages, went out 17 between September 1 and September 6. As Virgin Mobile Assurance Wireless obtained 18 new customers or customers were reactivated in Utah 19 20 because they had usage on their account, Assurance 21 Wireless ensured that those customers would receive the 22 same text messages and communications. So those have 23 occurred since September 6th until the present date, 24 depending upon new activations or reactivation. 25 Thank you. Please explain how this Q.

## 1 transaction serves the public interest.

- 2 A. Yeah. So the parties believe that the
- 3 transaction serves the public interest as it benefits
- 4 the Lifeline customers of both Assurance Wireless and
- 5 Access Wireless. Both customer sites will receive
- 6 increased voice minutes, free voice minutes up to 500,
- 7 free voice minutes from their current allotment of 350
- 8 and 250.
- 9 The combined company will provide increased
- 10 scale in the Lifeline market, allowing for new and
- 11 innovative offerings in Lifeline, and it will support
- 12 competition as the company will have additional
- 13 resources in the Lifeline market.
- 14 The management team of i-wireless that will
- 15 survive the transaction will be completely focused on
- 16 Lifeline and bring increased focus to the customers of
- 17 Virgin Mobile right now. Also the combined resources
- 18 will allow the combined company to compete effectively
- 19 in the evolving Lifeline market that is going to occur
- 20 with the imposition of the FCC's Lifeline modernization
- 21 order and its emphasis on providing -- plans to Lifeline
- 22 customers.
- 23 COURT REPORTER: On providing what?
- 24 THE WITNESS: We also believe there is no
- 25 adverse impact --

Page 13 1 (The witness continues to talk while the judge 2 tried to stop him.) 3 JUDGE JONSSON: Could you stop just a minute? 4 (Witness continues to talk.) JUDGE JONSSON: Okay. Stop for just a minute. 5 He said that it will -- the transactions will allow the 6 7 companies to respond to the FCC's order requiring broadband plans. 8 COURT REPORTER: Requiring broadband plans. 9 10 Okay. And so after that, I didn't get anything. 11 JUDGE JONSSON: Okay. So we need you to go 12 back and repeat what you said after you mentioned 13 broadband plans. The court reporter wasn't able to get 14 that. 15 Oh. My apologies. No problem. And so after Α. I mentioned the broadband plans and the Federal 16 Communications Commission Lifeline modernization order, 17 I also stated that the parties believed that this 18 19 transaction will have no adverse impact on the 20 transferred Assurance Wireless customers because they 21 will be able to use the same telephone and the same 22 telephone number once they are transitioned to Access 23 Wireless. Overall, the parties believe the transaction is in the public's interest. 24 Thank you. And what is the status of the 25 Q.

Page 14 1 transaction? 2 Α. So the parties provided notice of the 3 transaction and of the customer transfer in 4 approximately 30 states. The other states where the parties operated jointly, the Federal Communications 5 Commission regulates the Lifeline offerings of the 6 company, so notice was not provided in those states. 7

- 8 Several states require approval of the
- 9 transaction, and we have received all the relevant
- 10 approvals of the transaction except in two states, those
- 11 being the one we're at right now, Utah, and the other is
- 12 West Virginia.
- We believe the West Virginia approval is
- 14 eminent. The staff has recommended approval in West
- 15 Virginia. No administrative law judge has been assigned
- 16 to the case in West Virginia, and we are expecting a
- 17 commission order to be issued any day.
- 18 The other jurisdiction here that we need to
- 19 talk about is the Federal Communications Commission, the
- 20 FCC. The parties filed a 214 application for transfer
- 21 of control of i-wireless. That was back in June. And
- 22 the -- that 214 application was deemed approved by the
- 23 FCC on July 15, 2016.
- The other element of the transaction at the
- 25 FCC is an amended compliance plan that i-wireless filed.

- 1 It describes the transaction and updates i-wireless's
- 2 compliance plan as a non-facilities-based carrier. We
- 3 believe that approval of that amended compliance plan at
- 4 the FCC also is imminent.
- 5 Q. Thank you.
- 6 MS. BERTELSEN: With that, Mr. Schifman is
- 7 available for questions.
- 8 MR. JETTER: I have no questions from the
- 9 division. Thank you.
- 10 JUDGE JONSSON: Thank you. All right.
- 11 Mr. Jetter, did you want to call your witness?
- 12 MR. JETTER: Yes, your Honor. The division
- 13 would like to call and have sworn in Mr. Casey Coleman.
- JUDGE JONSSON: Mr. Coleman, do you swear to
- 15 tell the truth today?
- 16 THE WITNESS: Yes.
- 17 JUDGE JONSSON: Go ahead.
- 18 CASEY J. COLEMAN,
- 19 called as a witness at the instance of the Division of
- 20 Public Utilities, having been first duly sworn, was
- 21 examined and testified as follows:
- 22 DIRECT EXAMINATION
- 23 BY MR. JETTER:
- 24 O. Good morning, Mr. Coleman. Would you please
- 25 state your name and occupation for the record.

- 1 A. My name is Casey J. Coleman, and my occupation
- 2 is a utility technical consultant for the Division of
- 3 Public Utilities.
- 4 Q. Thank you. And have you had the opportunity
- 5 to review the September 2nd, 2016, filing with the
- 6 commission regarding the transaction we're here
- 7 reviewing today?
- 8 A. Yes, I have.
- 9 Q. Are you comfortable with -- or I shouldn't say
- 10 comfortable. Are you satisfied that the information
- 11 provided was sufficient to make a recommendation to the
- 12 commission on approval or denial of this application?
- 13 A. Yes.
- Q. And would you please just tell the commission
- 15 for the record what the division's opinion is on whether
- 16 this is in the public interest?
- 17 A. Sure. The division believes that this
- 18 transaction is in the public interest. As stated in the
- information and also stated here today, customers won't
- 20 have any adverse impact as far as how they are able to
- 21 use their phones, and customers at the end of the day
- 22 will actually be getting more minutes and increased text
- 23 messages and the ability to use some data which they
- 24 didn't have before.
- 25 And so because of those two reasons and a

Page 17 variety of others that have already been said, the 1 2 division believes it's in the public interest to approve 3 this transaction. 4 Ο. Thank you. 5 MS. BERTELSEN: I have no further questions 6 for Mr. Coleman, and he's available for cross-examination. 7 8 JUDGE JONSSON: Any questions? 9 MS. BERTELSEN: I have no questions. 10 you, your Honor, for the opportunity. 11 JUDGE JONSSON: You're welcome. So one of the 12 things that we have to make as a finding under the rule 13 is whether there has been any opposition to the proposed 14 transaction. Now, I can sort of intuit that, but it would be sort of helpful, Mr. Schifman, if you would 15 16 just testify as to whether there's been any opposition from any state or regulatory body. 17 18 MR. SCHIFMAN: No, there hasn't. 19 JUDGE JONSSON: Okay. Great. I think I have 20 everything I need then. So we can go ahead and close 21 this hearing. I will prepare an order today and get it 22 to the commissioners. They generally get back to me 23 pretty promptly, sometimes on the same day. So we'll
