Re: Permission to access property for soil sampling

Dear Landowner,

Rocky Mountain Power is proposing to construct a new 500/345 kilovolt electrical transmission line to interconnect existing substations located in Juab and Salt Lake County. This project will involve crossing lands in Juab, Utah, Tooele and Salt Lake counties. As of this date several routes are under consideration with the final route yet to be determined. Based on information obtained from the County Assessor parcel records we understand you own property along one of the study corridors.

To facilitate preliminary engineering decisions, the company needs to understand soil and ground conditions along the various corridor options. Rocky Mountain Power through its contractor, PSI, Inc., will take soil borings (geo-technical surveys) to gather this information. To support this objective, Rocky Mountain Power requests right-of-entry and solicits your permission to perform a geo-technical survey on your land. The work is anticipated to begin in November and be completed by February.

The sampling studies will require that your property be accessed by a truck with auger boring set up. All vehicles will be limited to existing roads, trails, tracks, or routes that you specify. The auger will dig a hole approximately 4-6 inches in diameter which will be backfilled after the digging. If you have a loose dog or locked gate on your property in the areas to be traversed, please let us know by indicating this on the enclosed Right-of-Entry form and identifying whom should be contacted before entering your property.

By signing the enclosed Right-of-Entry, you give permission to Rocky Mountain Power, and its contractors, to conduct these surveys which are needed to complete preliminary engineering. You may grant a right-of-entry with stipulations such as advance notice, or a desire to speak with or accompany survey staff on your property.

Permission to enter your property for survey and information gathering does not mean that you consent to a future easement or that a power transmission line would even be constructed across your property. Granting a right-of-entry only allows Rocky Mountain

Power to document soil conditions (nothing will be removed from the property), which would then be used in the analysis of engineering designs. The findings of these studies may result in adjustment to the transmission line location or approach to construction. Once the final route has been determined, you will be provided with additional information at that time if your land is affected.
