Dear Utah Public Service Commission Chair LeVar, Commissioners Clark and White,

As you review the requested rate hikes for solar usage proposed by Rocky Mountain Power, please consider the following important reasons for protecting customers of rooftop solar from these additional unfair fees. Solar is clean. More rooftop solar installations will assist Utah's air quality. Utah currently ranks **fourth in the nation on the list of the biggest releasers of toxic, hazardous materials (EPA, 2015)** into our air. According to the latest State of the Air report from the American Lung Association, Salt Lake City's air quality is ranked as the sixth worst in the nation (**Salt Lake Tribune, 2016**). We are already breathing daily extractions from the Kennecott Copper mine, and surrounding the Salt Lake Valley are several refineries that burn incessantly. We should encourage people to drive electric cars and plug them into their rooftop solar. I wish to install rooftop solar, but it must remain economically viable. Please deny Rocky Mountain Power's request to essentially fine Utah's rooftop solar customers.
