Dear Utah Public Service Commission:

I am writing to you regarding Docket No. 17-035-61. I want to address three areas of critical impacts that Utah distributed solar generation has on the Utah economy, the environment and our <u>path to resiliency</u>. It will be devastating for Utah, its citizens and humanity as a whole, if Rocky Mountain Power's flawed analysis of a 1.5 cent value on a solar kilowatt hour is permitted to stand without considering what it has overlooked.

Let me start by telling you a personal story and how distributed solar energy generation saved me from economic despair and how I am now a strong contributor to the Utah state tax base.

ECONOMICS:

I was a photographer and a frame-maker when the 2008 housing-bubble burst and my revenue resources disappeared overnight. I tried to ride out the economic downturn for several years, but my clients were not returning. I hold a bachelor's degree in Communications and an associate degree in Electronics. I was picking up temp work when and where I could and was being underpaid and undervalued and contributed very little to Utah's tax base.

If I was going to survive economically and continue to be a positive contributor to society, I was going to have to reinvent myself. In 2014, I sent out a dozen resumes to various solar companies here in the Salt Lake Area. I was given an opportunity and discovered a new pathway, not only to economic recovery, but also to a field of work that I was passionate about and an industry I was proud to represent. It provided me and <u>6,000 other Utahns at its peak in 2016, with a good-paying job, one that allowed me to contribute into the Utah tax-base more than I ever had with my past sources of income as a photographer and a ski industry employee. If Rocky Mountain Power is successful in their efforts, it will result in the loss of 4,000 good paying jobs, as the industry will disappear overnight as it did in Nevada several years ago until Nevada passed the Solar Bill of Rights that brought back those solar industry jobs. It will force me to leave this beautiful state that I have called home for 29 years, to pursue my career in the solar industry in a state that has recognized its positive economic and environmental impacts.</u>

ENVIRONMENTAL:

At the same time, this new career path allowed me to provide a valuable asset to Utah Citizens - the opportunity to possess their own power-producing source while reducing their carbon footprint and helping improve the air quality in our valley, which we all know can be the worst anywhere in the world.

A rooftop solar array is a static event that produces a clean kilowatt-hour. With the irradiance value we have here in Utah, the amount of CO2 required to build that solar panel is offset within 1-3 years into its life expectancy, pending on the azimuth value of the homeowner. FYI, a solar module has a <u>25-year plus</u> life expectancy)

Simply look at the extreme weather events happening in our state, the country and around the world and we can painfully see that if science, truth and facts matter, we must reduce our CO2 footprint ASAP.

RESILIENCY:

Now that solar technology is out of the box, Utah citizens are viewing the opportunity to own their own energy-producing system as a right, which would be taken away by RMPs analysis.

It will also prohibit Utah citizens from pursuing a viable pathway to resiliency and self-reliance, where roof-top solar is the foundation. When on-site energy production is coupled with battery storage technology, the homeowner can create their own microgrid. This allows the homeowner to maintain power for several days during large-scale, grid-disruptive events.

Utah has seen two such large events and several smaller events in 2020. The 5.7 magnitude earthquake in March, knocked out the power of 50,000 valley residents. And just recently, the downslope wind event in September caused the loss of power to 190,000 Utah residents. The majority of these outages were for 1-2 days with 5,000 residents still without power 6 days later. Roughly 60,000 homes had to replace the food in their refrigeration which averages about \$400/household with an estimated cost of \$24,000,000 lost in food alone during this event. Home microgrids can prevent this loss.

There were an additional three smaller scale outages caused by Utah wildfires that compromised powerlines resulting in power outages. Utah is seeing a steady increase in wildfire events. In fact, according to the Utah Forest Service, <u>2020 is the worst Wildfire season</u> <u>Utah has ever seen</u>. This trend will negatively impact our antiquated grid system with increased power outages to follow.

Weather patterns and trends are showing that we can expect the frequency of these power outages to increase. <u>We must provide Utahns with the technology and resources they need</u> to endure through the challenging times ahead!

Rocky Mountain Power Flawed Analysis:

<u>VALUE:</u> The 1.5 cent value placed on a locally produced solar kilowatt-hour by Rocky Mountain Power, failed to consider a key and important factor. And that is Distribution.

The 1.5 cent value is the cost of a solar kilowatt-hour produced by a solar farm in the middle of nowhere. Once you factor in the substation required and the oversized wires and powerline system necessary to deliver that power to its loads, that price, according to RMPs' own Utah Subscriber Solar Program, is \$.124 (12.4 cents).

This is an existing program where RMP invested in a 20MW solar farm to sell 200-kilowatt-hour blocks at \$12.4 cents/kilowatt-hour to subscribers. But what we don't know is if that power is actually staying in Utah and being used by Utah consumers or exported to the open market.

It's one thing to purchase large volumes of kilowatt-hours in the open market. It's quite another to account for the source of those kilowatt-hours and how they will be delivered to Utah homeowners.

A solar kilowatt-hour produced by a Utah home and exported back onto the grid, is a locally produced kilowatt-hour that is passed on down the line to the next available load, i.e. the neighbor's house next door.

<u>AVOIDED COST</u>: The data from the Kem C. Gardner Policy Institute of the University of Utah, states that we will see an increase in our population of one million people by 2032. That translates to a lot of new homes and businesses to accommodate that growth. And that translates into a large increase in the energy required to power this growth. Solar can offset and avoid the cost to provide this increase in energy demand if given the chance to compete. For every home that installs solar, it will allow for the construction of a new home without increasing the state's demand on energy resources.

SUMMATION:

It is critical for all Utahns that the Commission account for the following factors when assessing the Rocky Mountain Power analysis and everything that their study has left out:

- Distribution Costs which again by RMP's own solar subscriber business model was found to be 12.4 cents
- Avoided Costs for every Utah home and business that has solar, a new home and business can be built without adding an additional demand on Utah's energy needs
- The economic impact to Utah and all of the thousands of good paying jobs that will be lost
- The pathway to Resiliency and Self Reliance that every Utah citizen should have the right to pursue
- The impact on the Environment and the Global Climate, which results in loss of life and a cost/price tag that continues to grow

As a Utah resident, I am writing to ask you to reject Rocky Mountain Power's proposed solar export credit rate (Docket No. 17-035-61).

This utility's proposed export credit rate reduction from 9.4 /kWh to ~ 1.5 /kWh is nothing more than an attempt by Rocky Mountain Power to misrepresent the value of rooftop solar in order to stifle competition and monopolize renewable power generation. The evidence provided throughout this solar export proceeding has both demonstrated the value of customergenerated exports and shown that Rocky Mountain Power has failed to adequately assess the value of excess solar energy in its proposed rate change.

A better solution than the proposed rate, which, if approved, would be among the most punitive in the nation, is an increased solar export credit rate. The Vote Solar Load Research Study demonstrates the value of customer-generated exports at 22° per kilowatt-hour. This value includes $10.57^{\circ}/kWh$ from utility-based benefits alone. Environmental and social benefits add an additional $12/03^{\circ}$ of benefits.

While it is important to recognize that rooftop solar customers are still very much on the grid, utilizing utility infrastructure, one cannot fairly calculate the cost of this over the many benefits to the grid, customers, and community provided by rooftop solar.

Rooftop solar creates many system-wide benefits enjoyed by all Rocky Mountain Power service area customers and the utility itself. Distributed energy generation from rooftop solar contributes to grid flexibility and resilience and avoids costly transmission upgrades. Additionally, rooftop solar helps create consumer choice and keeps customer dollars local. A punitive export credit rate would take all of these benefits away and would further exclude low-income communities from consumer choice. Rapid implementation of the utility's proposed export credit rate would create a shock for rooftop solar customers and the solar industry. Reducing the export credit by 84% would also jeopardize thousands of local jobs and create additional cost risks for customers through fuel price volatility and major infrastructure development.

Rooftop solar helps to ensure safe, reliable, adequate, and reasonably priced utility service, the guidance by which the Commission is to assess rate proposals. Evidence brought forth throughout this proceeding and by dozens of cases throughout the country confirm that a reduced solar export credit is the inappropriate regulatory response to rooftop solar and will serve to disincentivize the integration of renewable energy into Utah's energy portfolio. As a Utah resident, I am writing to ask you to reject Rocky Mountain Power's proposed solar export credit rate (Docket No. 17-035-61).

This utility's proposed export credit rate reduction from 9.4 /kWh to ~ 1.5 /kWh is nothing more than an attempt by Rocky Mountain Power to misrepresent the value of rooftop solar in order to stifle competition and monopolize renewable power generation. The evidence provided throughout this solar export proceeding has both demonstrated the value of customergenerated exports and shown that Rocky Mountain Power has failed to adequately assess the value of excess solar energy in its proposed rate change.

A better solution than the proposed rate, which, if approved, would be among the most punitive in the nation, is an increased solar export credit rate. The Vote Solar Load Research Study demonstrates the value of customer-generated exports at 22° per kilowatt-hour. This value includes $10.57^{\circ}/kWh$ from utility-based benefits alone. Environmental and social benefits add an additional $12/03^{\circ}$ of benefits.

While it is important to recognize that rooftop solar customers are still very much on the grid, utilizing utility infrastructure, one cannot fairly calculate the cost of this over the many benefits to the grid, customers, and community provided by rooftop solar.

Rooftop solar creates many system-wide benefits enjoyed by all Rocky Mountain Power service area customers and the utility itself. Distributed energy generation from rooftop solar contributes to grid flexibility and resilience and avoids costly transmission upgrades. Additionally, rooftop solar helps create consumer choice and keeps customer dollars local. A punitive export credit rate would take all of these benefits away and would further exclude low-income communities from consumer choice. Rapid implementation of the utility's proposed export credit rate would create a shock for rooftop solar customers and the solar industry. Reducing the export credit by 84% would also jeopardize thousands of local jobs and create additional cost risks for customers through fuel price volatility and major infrastructure development.

Rooftop solar helps to ensure safe, reliable, adequate, and reasonably priced utility service, the guidance by which the Commission is to assess rate proposals. Evidence brought forth throughout this proceeding and by dozens of cases throughout the country confirm that a reduced solar export credit is the inappropriate regulatory response to rooftop solar and will serve to disincentivize the integration of renewable energy into Utah's energy portfolio. Please consider increasing the export credit rate to reflect the real benefits created by rooftop solar.
