- Inversion (poor air quality) in Utah is not questionable we see it, we feel it.

Hi,

I would like to add one more comment. I feel the biggest thing you can do to save Utah jobs, is to reject the Rocky Mt Power proposal. Every household for solar is still paying monthly about \$9 to be using the grid, it is not free. I feel the 9.2 cents is fair, where in the summer the solar over production can be sold to the neighbors at 11.5 cents or 14.4 cents and still make a profit when they're buying it at 9.2 cents and only need to use 50 feet of wire from neighbor to neighbor. I feel this is a good compromise rather than kilowatt for kilowatt credit. This would keep Utah jobs, the designers, engineers, suppliers, sales reps, installers, landlords of office buildings, city inspectors and plan reviewers all employed. There is a domino effect when jobs are lost, and I believe Utah really values it's economy and families, since solar employs so many families. The gravy is helping the air quality as I feel this should be a long term solution, but the number one reason we should reject what Rocky mt is proposing is job loss. I am a homeowner who was on the brink of installing rooftop solar panels. I just learned of your deliberations.

So I am writing to encourage the Commission to remember it is a PUBLIC utility commission. Therefore, its decisions cannot side with purely with profit, but must give considered weight to the benefits to the PUBLIC in any of its decisions regulating Rocky Mountain Power. RMP is attempting to reverse the momentum of roof-top solar energy in Utah just when both our polluted air and customers' well-being need to have *more* incentives for solar to be ramped up.

<u>The New York Times</u> reported on Sept 29th on the "galloping" pace of roof-top solar and the tremendous advantages it has brought cities in Australia.https://www.nytimes.com/2020/09/29/business/energy-environment/australia-rooftop-solar-coal.html Are Australian regulators be more sophisticated that Utah's?

No crocodile tears for \$23 bil RMP: It paid solar homeowners less than 1% of its sales last year for energy returned to the grid. If an owner would get only 1.5 cents for their excess energy, why pay personally \$10-\$20,000 for solar installation for the intangible public good, when the PUBLIC utility that is already extremely profitable has been charged with increasing energy efficiency and reducing carbon emissions?

In July, 2019, Kevin Emerson wrote inthe Salt Lake Tribune:

"...the Wattsmart energy efficiency programs that Rocky Mountain Power implemented during 2008-2017 provided over **\$1 billion in net economic benefits for the utility** and its customers.

Unfortunately, Rocky Mountain Power scaled back its cost-effective energy efficiency programs starting in 2018.If the rollbacks are approved, Rocky Mountain Power will decrease the financial incentives and other assistance it provides to its customers to help them adopt energy-saving practices and technologies."

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The PSC should remind Rocky Mountain that the long-term viability of Utah's economy, air quality, water quality and our personal health depends on everyone doing their part to move the State to cleaner energy. As one of the State's major polluters, and a publically empowered, <u>wealthy monopoly</u>, RMP should be required do its part to encourage homeowners to install rooftop solar by making it a viable economic decision.

Utahns believe in free markets over government interference but the monopoly RMP has on energy requires PSC's intervention to level the playing field. That is the role of government/. Instituting a viable financial incentive for homeowners to obtain roof-top solar is a market-based solution.

Please do NOT approve the 1.5 cents per kWh but encourage growth in our cleanenergy capacity with an export credit of 9.2 cents per kWh, guaranteed for 20 yrs. And I will move forward with my solar contract with confidence.



I am a Salt Lake City resident with 40+ solar panels on my home. I am writing to express my opposition to the proposal RMP has made to reduce reimbursement rates for solar customers that is now before the public service commission. I express this opposition for several reasons:

The norm in the rest of the country is even higher than the current reimbursement rates. It makes no sense to reduce the rate even further.

The rates proposed by RMP rely on simplistic economic arguments that do not take into account avoided costs, intangible costs like reductions in air pollution, benefits of distributed power generation, etc and the benefits RMP realizes by not having to build additional generation facilities.

The public service commission should be looking out for the good of the broad public and not just the narrow interests of RMP as articulated in their rate proposal. Encouraging low emission generation and distributed power generation alone argue for your turning down the RMP proposal and, at a minimum, retaining the current reimbursement rates.

Of course Rocky Mountain Power can get power cheaper on the grid! They would be buying it from fossil fuel sources! We have so much available solar in Utah, why not make use of it and offset the home owner's cost for installing it.

As a resident of Utah, I am urging you to reject Rocky Mountain Power?s proposal to reduce the export credit rate of rooftop solar by up to 85%. The change in value for residential customers from 9.2?/kWh to 1.5?/kWh is not supported by sound science, as demonstrated by the vastly different valuations between the Rocky Mountain Power and Vote Solar studies. The rate change would result in drastic job losses for an entire industry, compounding the hardship of the current economic crisis in this state. Additionally, by allowing this change, the Public Service Commission would be condoning Rocky Mountain Power?s monopolization of sun power, and cutting off Utahns' right to energy choice.

Our energy grid is rapidly evolving. The future of the grid must include a diversity of resources, including distributed generation which supports greater community resiliency. As a resident of Utah, I am urging you to reject Rocky Mountain Power?s proposal to reduce the export credit rate of rooftop solar by up to 85%. The change in value for residential customers from 9.2?/kWh to 1.5?/kWh is not supported by sound science, as demonstrated by the vastly different valuations between the Rocky Mountain Power and Vote Solar studies. The rate change would result in drastic job losses for an entire industry, compounding the hardship of the current economic crisis in this state.
