The resulting rooftop solar export credit proposal of 3.2 to 3.5 cents is a drastic change from the final decision made in October of 2020, and would therefore require greater scrutiny and stakeholder input than the appeal process allows.

Additionally, the resulting new rate would not represent a just and reasonable rate, disincentivizing our right as Utahns to produce our own power and therefore reducing the resiliency benefits of distributed generation and harming the overall well-being of the state of Utah.
