Dear Commissioners Fenn, Clark, and Harvey,

The second oldest community council in Utah - *Canyon Rim Community Council* - in their meeting held on 11/06/24 moved to adopt the following resolution as an expression of our concern over utility rate and fee increases proposed by Rocky Mountain Power and now under consideration by the Utah Public Service Commission (PSC) in multiple dockets:

Whereas Rocky Mountain Power proposes to increase customers' utility bills with an 18% general rate increase [PSC #24-035-04], a 12% energy balancing account rise [PSC #24-035-01], \$62 for the 2023-24 excess liability insurance premium [PSC #23-035-40], and 4.95% for a new Utah Fire Fund, and

Whereas residential and commercial utility rates are likely to increase further due to worsening climate change related impacts such as prolonged droughts, heat waves, extreme weather events, and escalating wildfire risks according to testimony presented by Rocky Mountain Power to the Utah Legislature and to the Utah Public Service Commission, and

Whereas Rocky Mountain Power also acknowledges that its rate increases are needed to offset rising costs of climate change caused impacts that include infrastructure hardening against wildfires, third-party liability claims, and escalating insurance premiums, and

Whereas these customer cost increases may create financial hardships for families in our community, and

Whereas Rocky Mountain Power now generates over three-quarters of its electricity from burning fossil fuels, plans to remain heavily invested in fossil fuel combustion for decades to come, and has imprudently cancelled acquisition of available renewable energy and storage resources, and

Whereas the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change warns that "climate change and air pollution are exacerbated by the burning of fossil fuels, which increase CO2 emissions, the cause of global warming," and

Whereas the fossil fuel combustion emissions known to contain climate altering chemicals and pollutants are negatively impacting the health, health care costs, social and economic well-being, and overall quality of life of our neighborhood residents, and

Whereas Rocky Mountain's prioritization of fossil fuel-generated electricity has resulted in its costly reliance on vulnerable supply inventories, volatile market pricing, and the reopening of potentially dangerous coal mines,

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the *Canyon Rim Community Council* calls upon the Utah Public Service Commission to DENY Rocky Mountain Power any customer rate increases until such time as the following criteria are met:

1. The past, present, and future costs to our community of the negative health, economic, social, and other quality of life impacts of Rocky Mountain Power's use of fossil fuel combustion to generate electricity have been identified, quantified, monetarily assessed, and made publicly available.
2. Rocky Mountain Power submits to the PSC an energy generation plan that significantly reduces expenditures for the continued maintenance and operation of fossil fuel-based electricity production and agrees to decommission and dismantle all of its Utah coal plants by 2030.
3. The aforementioned energy generation plan shall contain, but not be limited to, potential electric utility rate structures that (a) reward customers who conserve energy and produce clean energy and (b) recover any additional system costs from those customers using the highest volumes of energy.

The Canyon Rim Community Council further requests that:

1. All information generated in response to this resolution be distributed complete and unredacted to the general public through the media and open public records, and

2. This resolution be recorded with public comments to PSC dockets #24-035-04, #24-035-01, and #23-035-40 respectively the general rate case (GRC), energy balancing account (EBA), and deferred accounting order (DAO) wildfire insurance dockets.
