Dear Utah Public Service Commission,

Long term plans should identify renewal energy sources. The consumers and other grant money should not be used to fix things we know are already broke, unhealthy choices and not viable for long term solutions. Utah is already has some of the most unhealthy air on the planet. Keeping these out of date power plant methods are only harming everyone. I would much rather have power restrictions, than approve of something that will dirty the air and kill me sooner. Please, for my health and yours, do not deviate from the renewal energy plans that were already in the works and those that can be developed in th future.

I am writing to express my concerns about Rocky Mountain Power's 2025 Integrated Resource Plan. This plan prioritizes costly, harmful technologies while reversing plans to invest in clean, affordable energy, leaving Utah ratepayers to bear the financial and health burdens.

RMP's continued reliance on outdated coal plants and expensive carbon-capture technology is a risk-laden plan that threatens to drive up energy costs.

More than 80% of RMP's requested rate increases in the last two years were due to high coal and gas costs. Meanwhile, Utah stands to gain millions in tax revenue and thousands of jobs by expanding renewable energy, according to an analysis by Current Energy. Yet PacifiCorp's plan moves in the opposite direction.

I urge you to reject costly, high-risk continued reliance on fossil fuels and instead push Rocky Mountain Power and PacifiCorp to prioritize affordable, reliable clean energy that benefits Utah families and businesses. When RMP's pursuit of carbon capture and small-scale nuclear fail to materialize, it will be RMP's customers who pay the price. RMP should be investing in clean energy today, when it is cheapest, not waiting until the 2030s to commit. Utahns shouldn't have to pay more for decisions that benefit corporate shareholders and hurt our communities.

Please advocate for an energy plan that protects ratepayers, public health, and our economic future by rejecting PacifiCorp's current Integrated Resource Plan.
