To Whom it May Concern:

I understand the Utah Public Service Commission is currently reviewing plans from Rocky Mountain Power that explain the kinds of materials it will use to generate power for the next 20 years. The company said it will use coal and gas exclusively, rather than transition to cleaner wind and solar power sources. This is inexcusable. The exceedingly warm, dry winter we are all experiencing is primarily caused by too much CO2 in the atmosphere, which is caused by burning fossil fuels. Rocky Mountain Power's plans will only make this problem worse, much worse.

Already we are facing problems like farmers in Box Elder County only having enough water for 1/3 of their normal crops. Great Salt Lake is drying up, which will be catastrophic for the 10 million migrating birds that depend on the lake for food from brine shrimp and brine flies. The heavy metals in the lakebed are now picked up by winds that shower the communities that live near the lake (including Ogden, Tremonton and Salt Lake City,) with toxic dust. The Colorado River is down to a trickle and Glen Canyon Dam may not have enough water to generate the power 40 million people depend on. All these problems and many more are caused by too much CO2 in the atmosphere.

And Rocky Mountain Power's current plan wants to contribute more CO2. This must not be allowed to happen. Please ignore the calls to burn more coal and gas. Those are only short term financial gains for a few and devastating to everybody else. Make it mandatory that Rocky Mountain Power transition now to sustainable power.

I am a 30+ years resident of Draper and am proud to call Utah my home after moving from Pennsylvania. I am a skier, hiker, golfer, mountain biker, and climber that uses our mountains and canyons with some frequency. I also happen to suffer from life-long asthma and am especially sensitive to air pollution, most particularly during the Salt Lake valley inversions. On many days during the winter, the air conditions are so bad I simply cannot spend any significant time outside despite my love of the outdoors. I was also deeply concerned by the snowpack this year and the steady shrinking of the Great Salt Lake.

I am writing to urge you to scrutinize the energy plan proposal from Rocky Mountain Power and to seriously consider substantially increasing the level of clean and renewable power sources and storage that will drive Utah towards a clean energy future. With its high desert and desert climates, Utah has an abundant potential for renewable energy and storage, including solar, wind, and geothermal energy.
