Dear Commissioners,

I am writing to request the Public Service Commission reject the current Rocky Mountain Power long term energy plan and mandate they include renewable energy sources as much more substantial part of the plan.

Utah's future energy needs demand as many sources of electrical energy generation as possible. With the continued rising population growth of Utah along with the substantial increases in energy resulting from the inevitable growth of electric vehicles, AI computational demands, data centers and others, it is not in Utah's best interest for our electrical power provider to rely virtually strictly on oil, natural gas and coal as our source of electrical energy.

As we evaluate our future energy needs and how to provide for them, Utah must also consider our future standing within the global economy. China, along with other countries, are balancing their dependence on fossil fuels energy with substantial investments in renewable energy sources <https://ember-energy.org/latest-insights/china-energy-transition-review-2025/> To remain competitive in the global economy, Utah, likewise, must have the ability to meet our energy consumption needs from as many sources of electrical power generation as possible.

Utah relying on fossil fuels almost entirely for our electrical energy needs is a strategic mistake. We must not create a reliance on a particular energy source, but instead have multiple "tools in our tool box" to meet our future energy needs.

I urge the PSC reject the current RMP plan placing high dependency on fossil fuels and mandate that much more renewable energy sources be added to their plan.
