Dear Commissioners,

As a Utah resident and rate-paying residential customer of PacifiCorp (dba Rocky Mountain Power; RMP) and on behalf of my family in Utah, I urge you to approve Utah Clean Energy's (UCE) "Request for Expedited Investigatory Docket and Agency Action" as it appears in Utah PSC Docket #25-035-52, and to use your jurisdictional authority under Utah statute to set in motion all elements of the expedited hybrid resource procurement process advocated in UCE's request.

I agree with UCE that the public interest will be well served by your convening this investigatory docket and launching a process to pursue potential time-sensitive resource procurements still eligible for Clean Energy Production Tax Credits (PTC) and Clean Electricity Investment Tax Credits (ITC) that could save Utah ratepayers millions of dollars. I also ask that you direct PacifiCorp to initiate an expedited "open call" resource procurement process to facilitate its acquisition of tax-advantaged clean energy generation while there is still time, given constraints recently imposed by Congress' H.R. 1.

I hope that you will soon issue a scheduling order for this docket that enables all interested parties to participate in timely process planning and information sharing, especially as that participation may also inform final public and intervening parties' inputs to PacifiCorp/RMP's Utah 2025 Integrated Resource Plan (IRP) as well as preliminary inputs to the 2027 IRP. I'm aware that public comments to Utah's 20-year 2025 IRP, at Docket #25-035-22, are due by September 26, 2025, though a public witness hearing is set for October 29, 2025. I understand that the public input meeting process for the 2027 IRP begins October 1, 2025.

According to UCE's calculations, PacifiCorp ratepayers system-wide could save over \$11 billion for solar resources and nearly \$17 billion for wind resources procured using ITC/PTC tax credits before more expire at the end of this year. Since Utah customers represent 40% of PacifiCorp's customer base, families like mine could realize substantial savings.

With PacifiCorp/RMP's savings on wind and solar resources procured more cheaply via federal tax credits, the 2025 and 2027 jurisdictional IRPs for Utah might, for the first time, include cost-effective utility-scale geothermal resource acquisitions in my state. Dispatchable geothermal baseload energy production in Utah could replace some of the coal-fired energy --and its climate change-fueling pollution-- that the current 2025 Utah IRP unfortunately allows RMP's Emery County, Utah coal plants to produce past 2040.

As Utah residents, my family and friends face climate change-caused wildfire impacts that include: respiratory health costs, increased state taxes and RMP utility rates for wildfire mitigation, potential loss of homeowners insurance, and additional risks with associated heat extremes and an ongoing mega-drought that is dessicating the Great Salt Lake. We understand that more clean energy, such as solar, wind, geothermal, and storage made possible through ITC/PTC tax credits can offset the dirty energy (coal and "natural gas" methane) production that PacifiCorp now concentrates in it's RMP territory that includes Utah.

Expedited procurement of clean energy resources would also help stanch the loss of solar and wind industry jobs in Utah precipitated by anti-renewables federal policy changes enacted in 2025. According to the Solar Energy Industries Association, Utah's solar industry sector is poised to lose 2,700 direct jobs. Derek Miller, CEO of the Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce, worries that up to 7,500 downstream jobs could also be impacted. Miller said "We ought to be asking ourselves: 'What's good for the [Utah] economy?' And certainly what's good for the economy is not doing anything that would risk losing thousands of jobs."

Utah would put thousands of jobs at risk by not pursuing the opportunity presented by taking advantage of time-

sensitive ITC/PTC tax credits.

Thank you for your thoughtful attention to this public comment in which I strongly urge you to authorize all components of UCE's "Request for Expedited Investigatory Docket and Agency Action" through proceedings of Docket #25-035-52.

Dear Members of the Public Service Commissioners,

We want to share our strong support for the Public Service Commission opening an expedited procurement for Utah-based resources that remain eligible for the technology-neutral investment and production federal tax credits prior to the end of 2025.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 354 (IBEW 354) consists of 50 affiliated local electrical businesses which, together, represent over 3100 electricians in Utah. Our members build the infrastructure projects that enable Utah's economic growth, including many large-scale energy generation, storage, and transmission projects that fall under the Commission's jurisdiction.

We know that Utah will need to build significant amounts of new electricity generation, storage, and transmission resources to meet our state's growing energy needs. Ratepayers in Utah, including our members and their families, need the affordable, reliable electricity that has contributed to Utah's family-friendly, pro-growth state for years. It is important for the Public Service Commission to know this is not only an energy reliability issue—it is a critical economic development issue for the local organizations and workers represented by the IBEW 354. Leveraging the federal tax credits set to phase out by the end of this year makes both economic and financial sense for Utah's rate-payers, workers employed in the energy sector, and Utah's energy future.

Eliminating red-tape and allowing expedited procurement by Rocky Mountain Power for tax-advantaged energy resources will help ensure that projects are delivered at a much lower cost to our members, utility rate-payers, and Utah's communities. It will also help guarantee that timely, well-sited projects are built here in Utah rather than outside our borders, simultaneously building the workforce we need to secure Utah's economic and energy future through on-the-job training and apprenticeships. We ask that you do everything you can as a Commission to ensure that a procurement process is created to build Utah-based energy resources and begin construction on those resources before the end of year.

Thank you for your leadership and for your consideration of this important step for Utah's energy future.
