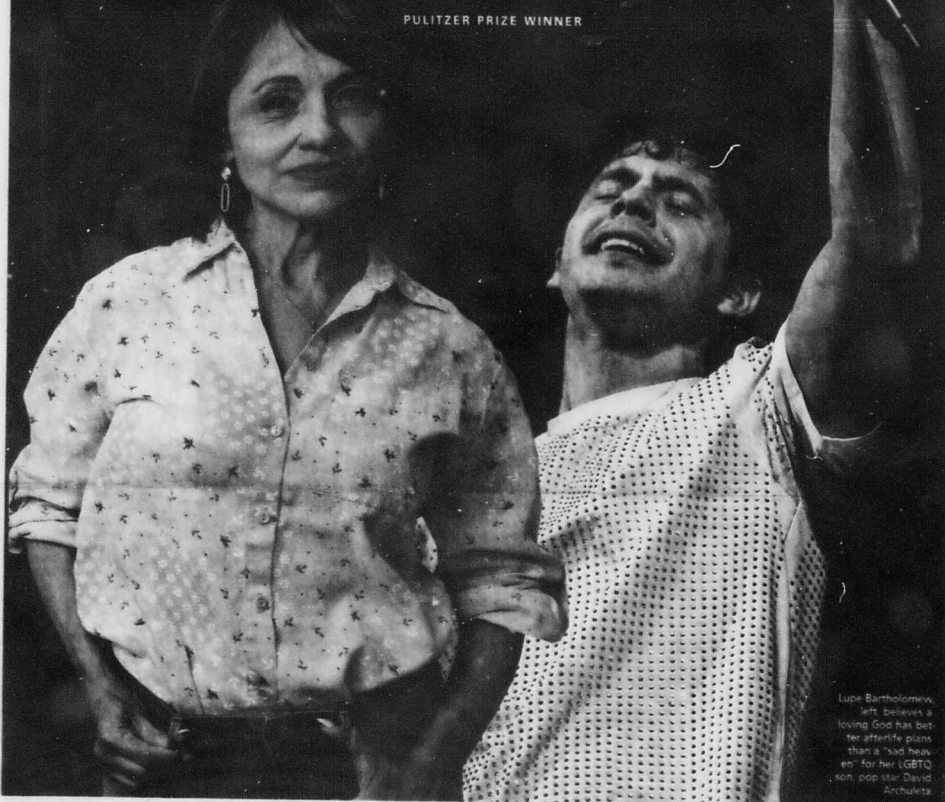

## Zions Bank: New leadership, same community focus

**New face at the top** » Scott Anderson retired last month after 33 years and a turbulent year. His successor, Paul Burdiss, says the future looks bright.

The window office in Zions Bank's downtown Salt Lake City headquarters looks different than it did a month ago. A single, solid wood desk in the middle of the room has been replaced by a U-shaped workstation by the door, complete with a standing desk.

The oil paintings on display — most borrowed from the

institution's massive art collection — have shifted from warm, desert oranges and sage greens to cooler alpine blues and purples. There's now a small conference table behind the door, and two leather seats near the back window.

It's a more contemporary design fit for the office's new occupant: Zions' new CEO and

President Paul Burdiss. Outgoing CEO Scott Anderson passed the baton to Burdiss at the beginning of April.

The leadership change marks a new chapter for Utah's first and oldest bank. And it comes on the heels of what could have been — and, for other banks, was — a catastrophic year.

But Zions' new and outgoing CEOs both said the bank's
