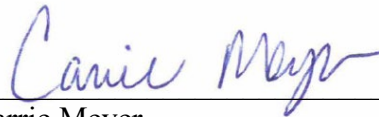

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PacifiCorp d/b/a Rocky Mountain Power (“Rocky Mountain Power” or “Company”) respectfully requests the Public Service Commission of Utah (“Commission”) approve the Company’s Application to Revise Tariff Schedule 98 (“Application”), the Renewable Energy Credits (“RECs”) Balancing Account (“RBA”). This Application is supported by the following:

1. Rocky Mountain Power is a division of PacifiCorp, an Oregon corporation, that provides electric service to retail customers in the states of Idaho, Wyoming, and Utah, and to the states of Oregon, California, and Washington as Pacific Power. Rocky Mountain Power is a regulated public utility in Utah and is subject to the Commission’s jurisdiction for retail electric rates and service conditions. The Company provides retail electric service to over 1,000,000 customers and has approximately 1,800 employees in Utah. Rocky Mountain Power’s principal place of business in Utah is 1407 West North Temple, Suite 310, Salt Lake City, Utah 84116.

3. The Commission first approved Tariff Schedule 98 in 2011.¹ This Tariff tracks the difference between REC revenues included in base rates, and actual REC revenues collected from the Company's sale of RECs. The difference between REC revenues in rates, and from RECs sold by the Company, are tracked and deferred each month from January 1 to December 31 of each

calendar year (“Deferral Period”). The Company files an annual application in March to true-up the difference, including application carrying charges, between base rates and actual REC sales in each Deferral Period. Rates are adjusted each year to account for any over- or under-collections during the Deferral Period.

4. The Company is proposing to refund approximately \$11.8 million from the 2025 Deferral Period. This is approximately \$3.0 million more than the refund level approved in RBA (“Schedule 98”).² The Company proposes to refund this \$11.8 million over 12 months, beginning June 1, 2026.

5. This Application includes the testimony and exhibits of Ms. Marcelina R. Hundis, Senior Environmental Commodity Trader for Energy Supply Management; Mr. Nicholas L. Highsmith, Revenue Requirement Manager; and Mr. Kenneth Lee Elder, Jr., Director of Pricing and Tariff Policy. Ms. Hundis discusses historical REC sales that inform the Schedule 98 rate. Mr. Highsmith discusses the allocation of total-Company sales to Utah and calculates the deferral to true-up calendar year 2025 REC sales. Mr. Elder discusses the Company’s proposed REC revenue spread and RBA rates in this case.

6. Ms. Hundis’ testimony discusses the Company’s total 2025 REC revenues. **Confidential Exhibit RMP ___(MRH-1)** contains a summary table of actual REC revenues by month and by resource for calendar year 2025, excluding certain revenue from REC’s sold to Kennecott Utah Copper (“Kennecott”), Leaning Juniper Wind Wake Loss and the Pryor Mountain wind project. **Confidential Exhibit RMP ___(MRH-2)** summarizes actual REC sales by entity, tag price, resource, and vintage for calendar year 2025. **Confidential Exhibit RMP ___(MRH-3)** details the final November and December 2024 actual REC revenues by resource. **Confidential**

Exhibit RMP___(MRH-4) details the RECs transferred to Kennecott under the Non-Generation and REC Supply Agreement between the Company and Kennecott (“Kennecott Agreement”).³

7. Mr. Highsmith’s testimony provides the detail for the \$11.8 million balance in the Deferral Period. **Exhibit RMP___(NLH-1)** summarizes, on a Utah-allocated basis, the 2025 Deferral Period. This includes: the approximate \$9.2 million beginning balance rolled over from the previous 2024 Deferral Period; approximately \$14.9 million in revenue from the sale of RECs; a \$1.5 million incentive of ten (10) percent of total REC revenue;⁴ \$1 million in total revenue associated with the Kennecott Agreement, Leaning Juniper Wind Wake loss, and sale of Pryor Mountain RECs; compared to \$1.1 million of REC revenue set in base rates,⁵ and \$11.7 million in credits resulting from the 2025 RBA. This results in an overall \$11.8 million Deferral Period amount that should be refunded to customers, including approximately \$993 thousand in carrying charges at the applicable carrying charger rate. **Exhibit RMP___(NLH-2)** provides the detail of the monthly deferral calculation and the allocation of REC revenue to Utah.

8. Mr. Elder’s testimony discusses the Company’s proposed rate spread and proposes to allocate the Deferral Period refund across customer classes based on a cost of service factor 10 allocation. The Company’s proposed rate spread is found in **Exhibit RMP___(KLE-1)**, billing determinants and calculations of proposed rates in this case are found in **Exhibit RMP___(KLE-2)**, and the proposed rates for Schedule 98 are found in **Exhibit RMP___(KLE-3)**. Schedule 98 rates will terminate on May 31, 2026, and the new Tariff Schedule 98 rates will become effective on June 1, 2026. The Company’s proposed refunds per customer class are reflective in the table below.

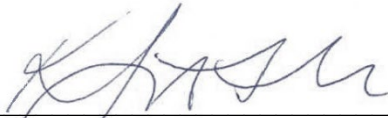
