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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	HEARING OFFICER: Why don't we get going then.
3	It's 9:03. So good everyone. My name is John Delaney and
4	I'm the Commission's presiding officer for this hearing.
5	Today is December 19, 2023 and it's approximately 9:03 a.m.
6	And this is the date and time that is scheduled for the
7	consolidated hearing in four dockets. I'm going to read
8	them all into the record, so sit back.
9	The first docket 23-057-19, the application of
10	Dominion Energy Utah to amortize the conservation enabling
11	tariff balancing account.
12	The second docket is Docket Number 23-057-20.
13	That's the application of Dominion Energy Utah to amortize
14	the energy efficiency deferred account balance.
15	The third docket is Docket Number 23-057-21,
16	application of Dominion Energy Utah for an adjustment to
17	the low income/energy assistance rate.
18	And finally the fourth docket is Docket Number
19	23-057-22, application of Dominion Energy Utah to change
20	the infrastructure rate adjustment.
21	Okay. Unless anybody has any corrections to
22	what I just stated on the record why don't we start with
23	appearances. We will begin with the applicant.
24	MS. CLARK: Thank you so much. My name is
25	Jenniffer Clark. I'm counsel for Dominion Energy. I have
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1	with me today Jordan Stevenson. He will be speaking on
2	behalf of the Company for the first three dockets on our
3	agenda today. And then I have Jesse Jackson also with me,
4	and he will speak to the fourth docket.
5	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much. For the
6	Division.
7	MR. GRECU: Good morning. Patrick Grecu,
8	assistant general representing the Division of Public
9	Utilities. The Division's witnesses this morning will be
10	Ryan Daigle speaking for the first and third docket. And
11	then Shauna Benbegnu Springer will be covering the dash 20
12	docket. And Eric Orton will be covering the dash 22
13	docket.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Great. Thank you.
15	Oh, this Eric here on the screen must be Eric Orton. Is
16	that accurate?
17	MR. ORTON: That's accurate.
18	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Great. So all of your
19	witnesses are here. Dominion, all of your witnesses are
20	here. It's 9:06 and we still I don't see anybody from
21	the Office of Consumer Services or Mr. Moore. Okay.
22	Preliminary matters, anybody have any? I have a couple.
23	MS. CLARK: None from the Company.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Because of the
25	compressed schedule that we're dealing with in these
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1	dockets I want to make sure we haven't missed any filings.
2	So the OCS office is not here, so I will not ask them the
3	question I had for them. But I do have a question for
4	Dominion. We don't have a record of any reply comments
5	being filed by Dominion. Is that intentional and we have
6	not missed something?
7	MS. CLARK: That is correct. That was
8	intentional. You have not missed anything.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Then unless anybody
LO	objects, and if so I want to know why, but I would like to
11	just proceed in order. So beginning with the 19 docket and
12	proceeding through to the end.
13	I do note the Division did include, I think,
L 4	that will be Mr. Daigle's testimony according to
15	Mr. Grecu's representation, but I want to treat them
16	separately. So we'll go in order and we will begin with
L7	the 19 docket.
18	Ms. Clark, please call your first witness in
19	the 19 docket.
20	MS. CLARK: Thank you. The Company calls
21	Mr. Stevenson.
22	HEARING OFFICER: Good morning, Mr. Stevenson.
23	THE WITNESS: Good morning.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Do you swear to tell the
25	truth?

1	THE WITNESS: I do.
2	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you. Please go
3	ahead.
4	DIRECT EXAMINATION
5	BY MS. CLARK:
6	Q. Thank you. Mr. Stevenson, would you please
7	state your full name and business address for the record?
8	A. Yes. Jordan Stevenson, 333 South State, Salt
9	Lake City, Utah.
10	Q. What position do you hold with the Company,
11	Mr. Stevenson?
12	A. I'm manager of regulation.
13	Q. Mr. Stevenson, in this docket the Company has
14	filed an application along with accompanying exhibits 1.1
15	through 1.5. Were those documents prepared by you or under
16	your direction?
17	A. Yes.
18	Q. Do you adopt their contents as your testimony
19	today?
20	A. Yes.
21	MS. CLARK: The Company moves to admit the
22	application and accompanying exhibits 1.1 through 1.5.
23	HEARING OFFICER: Any objection from the
24	Division?
25	MR. GRECU: No objection.
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1	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Motion granted.
2	MS. CLARK: Thank you.
3	Q. (By Ms. Clark) Mr. Stevenson, will you please
4	summarize the relief the Company is seeking today in this
5	docket?
6	A. Yes. In this docket the Company is requesting
7	to amortize the conservation enabling tariff, or CET,
8	balancing account. Section 2.08 of the Company's tariff
9	requires the Company to file a CET amortization application
10	at least annually with the Commission and this filing meets
11	that requirement.
12	The Company is requesting to amortize an over
13	collected balance of \$23.3 million. If approved this would
14	result in a decrease of \$17.92, or 1.85 percent, paid by a
15	typical customer using 70 decatherms per year.
16	The proposed rates are just and reasonable and
17	in the public interest. Therefore, the Company requests
18	that the rates be approved with rated going into effect on
19	January 1, 2024.
20	This concludes my summary.
21	Q. Thank you, Mr. Stevenson.
22	MS. CLARK: The Company's witness is available
23	for Commission questions and cross examination.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much. For the
25	Division any questions?

1	MR. GRECU: I just have one question.
2	CROSS EXAMINATION
3	BY MR. GRECU:
4	Q. In recent years the Company has typically
5	concurrently filed a pass through 191 for the balancing
6	account. With this application, and especially recent
7	years, I'm just wondering if you could explain why the
8	Company hasn't filed a pass through 191 application yet?
9	A. Yeah, I can speak to it at a high level. In my
10	current role I do not manage or supervise the pass through
11	account, but I can speak to it as I work with the people
12	that do. It was not made in relation to that position
13	was not made relation to anything we're talking about with
14	the CET in this docket. But we plan to file the pass
15	through account by the end of the year. The reason we have
16	not filed yet was just due to the high balance that we are
17	still amortizing in that pass through account. There is a
18	large under collected balance related commodity cost that
19	has been around since early this year, late last year that
20	happened in the winter season. We're working through
21	amortizing that balance down.
22	And so part of the decision to wait was in
23	relation to that balance as well as gas cost today and
24	whether or not we thought it was a prudent time to file.
25	So that decision is made typically independently.
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1	You're right. We do normally do couple these
2	to file together and that's actually just out of kind of
3	convenience and updating our billing system. It's not made
4	because there is any need to file these two filings
5	together from a rate taking standpoint, or tariff
6	standpoint. So that decision was made independently of the
7	CET filing.
8	MR. GRECU: Thank you. No further questions.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. I don't have any
10	questions for this witness. Thank you very much.
11	MS. CLARK: The Company has nothing further on
12	this docket.
13	HEARING OFFICER: Let's turn to the Division
14	then.
15	MR. GRECU: The Division calls Ryan Daigle.
16	HEARING OFFICER: Good Morning, Mr. Daigle.
17	THE WITNESS: Good morning.
18	HEARING OFFICER: Do you swear to tell the
19	truth?
20	THE WITNESS: I do.
21	HEARING OFFICER: Great. Thank you. Please
22	proceed.
23	DIRECT EXAMINATION
24	BY MR. GRECU:
25	Q. Mr. Daigle, could you please state and spell
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1	your name for the record?
2	A. Ryan Daigle, R-Y-A-N, D-A-I-G-L-E.
3	Q. By whom are you employed and what is your
4	position?
5	A. The Division of Public Utilities and I am a
6	utility analyst.
7	Q. What is your business address?
8	A. 160 East 300 South, Salt Lake City, Utah,
9	84114.
10	Q. Could you provide a brief overview of your
11	educational background and relevant work experience?
12	A. I have approximately ten years in oil and gas
13	with approximately five years of that being in regulatory
14	work. And I have a bachelor of science in mechanical
15	engineering.
16	Q. Have you participated in this docket on behalf
17	of the Division?
18	A. I have.
19	Q. Regarding that participation could you describe
20	your activities?
21	A. I reviewed the conservation enabling tariff and
22	low income assistance program applications as well as the
23	accompanying exhibits to confirm adherence to establish
24	Commission orders and to determine if the rates were just,
25	reasonable and in the public interest.

1	Q. Did you prepare or cause to be filed or
2	participate in the preparation of the filing of the
3	Division's action request response filed on December 15,
4	2023 in this docket?
5	A. Yes.
6	Q. Do you have any changes or corrections to that
7	filing?
8	A. I do not.
9	Q. Do you adopt the contents of that filing as
10	part of your testimony today?
11	A. I do.
12	Q. Based on your review would approval of this
13	application be just, reasonable and in the public interest?
14	A. Yes, I believe it would.
15	MR. GRECU: I would like to move the Division's
16	action request response filed on December 15, 2023.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Any objections from Dominion?
18	MS. CLARK: No.
19	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Your motion is
20	granted.
21	MR. GRECU: Thank you.
22	Q. (By Mr. Grecu) Mr. Daigle, do you have a
23	summary to share today?
24	A. I do.
25	Q. Please proceed.
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1	A. On December 1, 2023 Dominion filed its
2	application to amortize the conservation enabling tariff
3	balancing account in this docket number 23-057-19.
4	The conservation enabling tariff is designed to
5	allow Dominion to collect a commission authorized revenue
6	per customer. In its application Dominion requests to
7	amortize the October 2023 over collected balance of
8	approximate \$23.3 million.
9	Their previous filing, which was docket number
LO	22-057-15 requested to amortize the under collected amount
11	of approximately \$4.1 million.
12	If approved, independent of the other
13	concurrently filed applications, the typical GS residential
L 4	customer using 70 decatherms per year will receive a
15	reduction to their annual bill of \$17.92, or 1.85 percent.
16	The proposed change is in the public interest and
L 7	represents just and reasonable rates.
18	As it is not subject to Division audit, the
19	Division recommends the Commission approve the requested
20	change in docket 23-057-19 as a final rate with an
21	effective date of January 1, 2024.
22	This concludes my summary.
23	MR. GRECU: The witness is now available for
24	cross examination and questions from the hearing officer.
25	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Dominion, any

1	questions for this witness?
2	MS. CLARK: No questions. Thank you.
3	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. I do have a
4	question for you, Mr. Daigle. In the Division's comments,
5	were you the author of those comments?
6	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
7	HEARING OFFICER: In those comments on page 2,
8	the comments specifically note the over collection was
9	consistent and it happened in 11 of 12 months.
10	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
11	HEARING OFFICER: The comments they offer some
12	likely explanations as to why this occurred, and it also
13	further notes that there have been discussions between the
14	Division and Dominion, and that the Division will continue
15	to review and monitor both programs, the programs noted in
16	the comments, or the conservation enabling tariff, and the
17	weather normalization program. Are you with me so far?
18	THE WITNESS: Yes, I am.
19	HEARING OFFICER: How is DPU, or how is the
20	Division planning on doing those two things? How is it
21	going to review and monitor both programs and how often?
22	Give me some context and some color on that topic please.
23	THE WITNESS: I would say through
24	correspondence with the Company we will continue to monitor
25	those programs within the first quarter of next year to

1	make sure that the rates effectively bring that over
2	collection down. I believe the Company has also agreed to
3	more closely scrutinize that account to make sure that
4	those programs are functioning correctly.
5	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. And that belief is
6	based on your conversations that are alluded to in the
7	comments?
8	THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. That's the only
10	question I have for this witness.
11	Dominion, do you have any follow-up questions
12	for this witness on the line of questions I just raised?
13	MS. CLARK: No. Thank you.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Great. Then I have
15	nothing further. Thank you.
16	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Why don't we move on
18	to the next docket then. Is there anything else on the 19
19	docket?
20	MS. CLARK: No.
21	HEARING OFFICER: Let's move on to the dash 20
22	docket. That is 23-057-20. Ms. Clark, would you like to
23	call your first witness?
24	MS. CLARK: Thank you. The Company once again
25	calls Mr. Stevenson.

1	HEARING OFFICER: Mr. Stevenson, you're still
2	under oath, but good morning again.
3	THE WITNESS: Good morning.
4	DIRECT EXAMINATION
5	BY MS. CLARK:
6	Q. Mr. Stevenson, I will we all know who you
7	are and who you work for and what you do. Let me ask this.
8	In this second docket on the agenda today, 23-057-20, the
9	Company submitted an application along with accompanying
10	exhibits 1.1 through 1.6. Were all of those documents
11	prepared either by you or under your direction?
12	A. Yes.
13	Q. Do you adopt their contents as your testimony
14	today?
15	A. I do.
16	MS. CLARK: The Company would move for the
17	admission of the application in this matter along with its
18	accompanying exhibits 1.1 through 1.6.
19	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Division, any
20	objection to that motion?
21	MR. GRECU: No objection.
22	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Motion granted.
23	MS. CLARK: Thank you.
24	Q. (By Ms. Clark) Mr. Stevenson, will you please
25	summarize the relief the Company seeks in the second
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1	docket?
2	A. Yes. In this docket the Company seeks for
3	approval to adjust the amortization rate of the energy
4	efficiency deferred account balance.
5	As of September 30, 2023 the deferred account
6	balance amounted to an over collected balance of
7	\$2,482,566. With this adjustment to the rate based on
8	forecast of 2024 plus expenditures and projected volumes
9	for the 2024 test period, the Company will collect the
L O	necessary revenue to support the energy efficiency program
L1	while minimizing interest expense for customers and the
L2	Company.
L 3	If approved this will result in a decrease of
L 4	\$3.08 per year, or .32 percent paid by a typical customer
15	using 70 decatherms per year.
L6	The proposed rates are just and reasonable and
L 7	in the public interest and the Company requests that the
L8	rates be approved on an interim basis with rates coming
L9	into effect on January 1, 2024.
20	This concludes my summary.
21	MS. CLARK: Mr. Stevenson is available for
22	cross examination and also any questions from the hearing
23	officer.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
25	Mr. Grecu, any questions for the Division from this
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1	witness?
2	MR. GRECU: The Division has no questions.
3	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. I have no questions
4	either.
5	MS. CLARK: Thank you. The Company has nothing
6	further.
7	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much. For the
8	Division, please call your witness on this docket.
9	MR. GRECU: The Division would like to call
10	Shauna Benbegnu Springer.
11	HEARING OFFICER: Good morning, Ms. Springer.
12	Do you swear to tell the truth today?
13	THE WITNESS: Good morning. Yes, sir.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Please go ahead.
15	DIRECT EXAMINATION
16	BY MR. GRECU:
17	Q. Could you please state and spell your name for
18	the record?
19	A. Shauna Benbegnu-Springer, S-H-A-U-N-A,
20	B-E-N-B-E-G-N-U, S-P-R-I-N-G-E-R.
21	Q. By whom are you employed and what is your
22	position?
23	A. I am employed by the Utah Division of Public
24	Utilities as a utility technical consultant.
25	Q. What is your business address?
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1	A. Heber Wells Building, Fourth Floor, 160 East
2	300 South, Salt Lake City, Utah, 84114.
3	Q. Could you provide a brief overview of your
4	educational background and relevant work experience?
5	A. I have a bachelor of science degree in
6	management and a bachelor of science in accounting. I also
7	have three years in government administration and
8	accounting, plus 16 years of utility regulation.
9	Q. Have you participated in this docket on behalf
10	of the Division?
11	A. Yes, I have.
12	Q. Regarding your participation in this docket
13	could you briefly describe your activities?
14	A. I have reviewed the application that was
15	submitted by the Company, made comparisons to previous
16	applications and delved into the various components of the
17	application such as the balances and expenditures and
18	revenue. I have done some analysis on various rates to see
19	what would be the most optimized rate for the program in
20	order to meet the objective of collecting funds to cover
21	the expenses and minimizing the amount of interest.
22	Q. Did you prepare and cause to be filed or
23	participate in the preparation in the filing of the
24	Division's action request response filed December 15, 2023
25	in this docket?

1	A. Yes, I have.
2	Q. Do you have any changes or corrections to that
3	filing?
4	A. No, I do not.
5	Q. Do you adopt the contents of that filing as
6	part of your testimony today?
7	A. Yes, I do.
8	Q. Based on your review, would approval of this
9	application on an interim basis be just, reasonable and in
10	the public interest?
11	A. Yes, it will.
12	MR. GRECU: I would like to move to admit the
13	Division's action request response filed December 15, 2023.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
15	Dominion, any objections to that motion?
16	MS. CLARK: No.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. The motion is granted.
18	MR. GRECU: Thank you.
19	Q. (By Mr. Grecu) Do you have a summary to share
20	today?
21	A. I do. On December 1st Dominion Energy filed
22	its application to amortize the energy efficiency deferred
23	account balance to decrease the energy efficiency rate and
24	have the new rates effective January 1, 2024.
25	The current established position of energy
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1	efficiency program shows a negative balance of
2	approximately \$2.5 million resulting from an over
3	collection from rate payers.
4	The objective is to calculate a new rate for
5	collecting of funds to cover the expenses of the energy
6	efficiency program and marketing the initiative while
7	minimizing the amount of interest income collected or paid
8	by the Company. The account balance fluctuates above or
9	below zero dollars of interest income during the year
10	within an intended net interest close to zero.
11	The Company provided two rate analysis
12	scenarios. Scenario A, a rate with no change. And
13	scenario B, a rate that decreases to 0.1597. The Division
14	conducted a third analysis, scenario C, at a rate of
15	0.18000 that was in the middle. Scenarios A and C resulted
16	both over collecting and paying interest income.
17	As proposed by Dominion, scenario B should be
18	the new proposed rate because over collecting and under
19	collecting will be balanced throughout the year. The
20	proposed rate decrease would minimize the net interest
21	amount from the period of January 1, 2024 through December
22	31, 2024.
23	Based on the projected balances a new proposed
24	rate will help meet financial goals of the energy
25	efficiency programs. The energy efficiency amortization
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1	rate from 0.2321 to 0.15907 for a decrease of 0.0414
2	decatherms will equate to a typical residential customer
3	using 70 decatherms a year seeing \$3.09 decrease in their
4	annual bill, or .32 percent decrease independent of any
5	other decreases that the Company may increases or
6	decreases the Company may provide to their rate.
7	The Division supports the Company's request to
8	amortize the energy efficiency deferred account balance and
9	decrease their rate and recommends the Commission to
10	approve the application on an interim basis until the
11	Division completes a more thorough review and audit of the
12	programs at issue. There are eight programs and one market
13	initiative that need to be reviewed in depth. Final
14	recommendations will be provided at a later date.
15	Based on the Division's initial review the
16	proposed rate is in the public interest and represents a
17	just and reasonable rate for Utah and customers. The
18	Division will continue to monitor the overall program and
19	individual measures. I would like to add that we do that
20	not only quarterly the reports that the Company submits,
21	but also through an advisory board that the Company holds
22	meetings with on a consistent basis to determine the
23	efficiency and improvement that they may need to consider.
24	This concludes my summary. Thank you.
25	MR. GRECU: The witness is now available for
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1	cross examination and questions from the hearing officer.
2	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
3	Dominion, any questions for this witness?
4	MS. CLARK: We have no questions. Thanks.
5	HEARING OFFICER: I do have one question,
6	Ms. Springer. In the Division's comments, were you the
7	author of those comments?
8	THE WITNESS: I was.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you. On page 2
10	in the first bullet point the comment says that exhibits
11	1.1 and 1.2 purport to meet the requirements of a previous
12	Commission order. The use of the word purport caught my
13	attention. I have to ask you, was there an issue or
14	problem with exhibits 1.1 and 1.2?
15	THE WITNESS: Not to my knowledge.
16	HEARING OFFICER: Yeah. I was just curious
17	because the word purport suggests that there may be some
18	dispute about whether or not they actually do what they're
19	supposed to do. And so as the author of those comments and
20	your use of the word purport, your testimony is you didn't
21	have a problem or an issue with what is represented in
22	exhibits 1.1 and 1.2 of Dominion's application?
23	THE WITNESS: Correct.
24	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Great. Thank you.
25	That's the only question I had.

1	THE WITNESS: Okay.
2	HEARING OFFICER: Anything further on this
3	docket from anybody then?
4	MR. GRECU: Nothing from the Division.
5	MS. CLARK: No.
6	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Great. Thank you very
7	much. Thank you for your testimony. Let's move to the
8	next docket, which is 23-057-21. Dominion, please proceed.
9	MS. CLARK: Thank you so much. We once again
10	and final time call Mr. Stevenson.
11	HEARING OFFICER: Please go ahead.
12	Mr. Stevenson, you're still under oath.
13	DIRECT EXAMINATION
14	BY MS. CLARK:
15	Q. Mr. Stevenson, in this docket, the third on our
16	agenda today, the Company filed an application with the
17	accompanying exhibits 1.1 through 1.5. Were those
18	documents also prepared by you or under your direction?
19	A. Yes, they were.
20	Q. Do you adopt the contents of those documents as
21	your testimony today?
22	A. I do.
23	MS. CLARK: The Company would move for the
24	admission of the application in docket 23-057-21 along with
25	the accompanying exhibits 1.1 through 1.5.

1	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
2	Mr. Grecu, any objection?
3	MR. GRECU: No objection.
4	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Motion granted.
5	MS. CLARK: Thank you so much.
6	Q. (By Ms. Clark) Mr. Stevenson, can you please
7	summarize the relief that the Company is seeking in this
8	docket?
9	A. Yes. In this docket the Company requests an
L O	adjustment to the energy assistance fund rate. This will
11	result in an annual decrease of 12 cents for a typical
12	customer per year and allow the program to maintain the
13	funding level of \$1.5 million per year.
L 4	The Company is also proposing to adjust the
15	current annual energy assistance credit to \$91 per
16	qualifying customer per year. This credit is based on an
L 7	ongoing annual participation level of 22,499 participants.
18	In addition, the Company proposes a
19	contribution of \$250,000 to the Utah Department of
20	Workforce Services, Housing and Community Development,
21	Weatherization Assistance Program over the next 12 months.
22	Depending on how actual participation shakes out over the
23	coming months, the Company will fine tune these amounts and
24	propose adjusting accordingly in its next filing that
25	covers this program.

1	The proposed rates are just, reasonable and in
2	the public interest. Therefore, the Company requests that
3	the rates be approved with going into effect on January 1,
4	2024.
5	This concludes my summary.
6	MS. CLARK: Mr. Stevenson is now available for
7	cross examination and any questions that the hearing
8	officer may have.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
10	Mr. Grecu, any questions of this witness for the Division?
11	MR. GRECU: No questions for the Division.
12	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. And I have no
13	questions for this witness either. Thank you.
14	MS. CLARK: Thank you. The Company has nothing
15	further on this docket.
16	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Mr. Grecu, for
17	the Division.
18	MR. GRECU: The Division would like to call
19	Ryan Daigle again.
20	HEARING OFFICER: Hello again, Mr. Daigle. You
21	are still under oath, so go for it.
22	THE WITNESS: Thank you. On December 1, 2023
23	Dominion filed its application for an adjustment to low
24	income/energy assistance rate in this docket number
25	23-057-21. The low income/energy assistance program
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1	provides an annual credit for enrolled low income
2	customers.
3	In this docket Dominion requests a rate change
4	to credit the \$105,332 of over collection in excess of the
5	target funding amount of \$1.5 million. The Company
6	estimates that approximately 22,499 heat qualifying
7	customers will apply for the credit, as not all customers
8	qualify for this credit, and request to provide a credit of
9	\$91 per eligible customer.
10	If approved, independent of the other
11	concurrently filed applications the typical GS residential
12	customer using 70 decatherms per year will receive a
13	reduction to their annual bill of 12 cents. The \$250,000
14	contribution to DWS for the weatherization program is
15	similar to the contribution of previous filings.
16	The proposed change is in the public interest
17	and represents just and reasonable rates. Because it is
18	not subject to a Division audit, the Division recommends
19	the Commission approve the requested rate change in this
20	docket to the low income/energy assistance program as a
21	final rate with an effective date of January 1, 2024.
22	This concludes my summary.
23	DIRECT EXAMINATION
24	BY MR. GRECU:
25	Q. Mr. Daigle, just to clarify, have you
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1	participated in this docket on behalf of the Division?
2	A. I did.
3	Q. And did you prepare and cause to be filed or
4	participate in the preparation of the filing of the
5	Division's actual request response filed in December of
6	2023?
7	A. Yes, I did.
8	Q. And do you adopt the contents of that filing as
9	part of your testimony today?
LO	A. I do.
11	Q. And based on review would approval of this
12	application be just, reasonable and in the public interest?
13	A. It would.
L 4	Q. At this point I would like to move the
15	Division's action request response filed December 15, 2023.
16	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Dominion, any
L7	objections to the motion?
18	MS. CLARK: No objection.
19	HEARING OFFICER: I'll grant the motion and
20	also apologize for directing the witness to begin before
21	you did what you wanted to do, Mr. Grecu. Motion is
22	granted.
23	MR. GRECU: No problem. Thank you. I think
24	that is it for this docket. The witness is available for
25	cross examination and questions from the hearing officer.

1	HEARING OFFICER: Dominion, any questions of

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1	BY MS. CLARK:
2	Q. Mr. Jackson, would you please state your full
3	name and business address for the record please?
4	A. Yes. My name is Jesse Jackson. My business
5	address is 333 South State Street, Salt Lake City, Utah.
6	Q. What position do you hold with the Company
7	Mr. Jackson?
8	A. I am a regulatory specialist.
9	Q. In this final docket on the agenda today,
10	Mr. Jackson, the Company has an application along with
11	accompanying exhibits 1.1 through 1.6. Did you prepare
12	those documents or were they prepared under your direction?
13	A. Yes.
14	Q. Do you adopt the contents of those documents as
15	your testimony today?
16	A. I do.
17	MS. CLARK: The Company would move for the
18	admission of the application and the accompanying exhibits
19	1.1 through 1.6.
20	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.
21	Mr. Grecu, any objection to that motion?
22	MR. GRECU: No objection.
23	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. The motion is granted.
24	MS. CLARK: Thank you.
25	Q. (By Ms. Clark) Mr. Jackson, can you please
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1	summarize the relief the Company seeks in this docket?
2	A. Yes. In this docket the Company seeks to
3	adjust the infrastructure tracker placement rate to include
4	investment related to replacement funds as of November 30,
5	2023.
6	In the last generate rate case in docket number
7	23-057-03, the Commission ordered that the tracker
8	investment amount to be reset to zero dollars and also
9	required the Company to accumulate \$84.7 million in
10	investment on or after January 1, 2022 before requesting an
11	infrastructure tracker filing and rate increase again.
12	As of November 30, 2023 the Company has reached
13	and surpassed that threshold. The Company is requesting
L 4	\$2.1 million in annual revenue related to this investment.
15	If approved this would result in an increase of
16	\$1.21 per year, or .13 percent paid by a typical customer
L 7	using 70 decatherms per year.
18	The proposed rates are just, reasonable and in
19	the public interest. Therefore, the Company requests that
20	the rates be approved on an interim basis with an effective
21	date of January 1, 2024.
22	This concludes my summary.
23	MS. CLARK: Mr. Jackson is now available for
24	cross examination and questions from the hearing officer.
25	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much.

1	Mr. Grecu, any questions of this witness for the Division?
2	MR. GRECU: No questions from the Division.
3	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. And Mr. Jackson, I
4	have no questions for you. Thank you.
5	MS. CLARK: The Company has nothing further on
6	this final docket.
7	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much. To the
8	Division.
9	MR. GRECU: The Division calls Eric Orton.
10	HEARING OFFICER: Good morning, Mr. Orton.
11	THE WITNESS: Good morning.

16	DIRECT EXAMINATION

20	A. My name is Eric Orton, E-R-I-C, O-R-T-O-N.
21	Q. By whom are you employed and what is your
22	position?
23	A. I am employed by the Utah Division of Public
24	Utilities. I'm a utility technical consultant.
25	Q. What is your business address?
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1	A. 160 East 300 South in Salt Lake City. I'm in
2	the Heber Wells building.
3	Q. Could you provide a brief overview of your
4	educational background and relevant work experience?
5	A. Sure. I have a master's degree in business
6	administration. I've been in utility regulation for the
7	State for over 25 years.
8	Q. Have you participated in this docket on behalf
9	of the Division?
10	A. I did.
11	Q. Resulting your participation in this docket,
12	can you describe your activities?
13	A. Sure. I reviewed the application as well as
14	any accompanying exhibits, compared that to the fund
15	requirements in the appropriate section of the tariff, and
16	I also referenced past year's filings and did my analysis
17	and proposed comments.
18	Q. Did you prepare and cause to be filed or
19	participate in the preparation of the filing of the
20	Division action request response filed on December 15, 2023
21	in this docket?
22	A. I did.
23	Q. Do you have any changes or corrections to that
24	filing?
25	A. I do have one correction. In the section
	Page 32

1	entitled issues, the last sentence, that first paragraph
2	which is on the second page, first line of the second page
3	it says 2023. It should read 2024.
4	Q. With that correction do you adopt the contents
5	of that filing as part of your testimony today?
6	A. I do.
7	Q. Based on your review would approval of this
8	application on an interim basis be just, reasonable and in
9	the public interest?
10	A. It would.
11	MR. GRECU: With that noted correction I would
12	like to move to admit the Division's action request
13	response filed December 15, 2023?
14	HEARING OFFICER: Dominion, any objection to
15	that motion?
16	MS. CLARK: No, no objection.
17	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you very much. The
18	motion is granted.
19	Q. (By Mr. Grecu) Mr. Orton, do you have a
20	summary to share today?
21	A. I do. Thank you. Based on preliminary review
22	of the application the Division recommends the Commission
23	approve the proposed rates in this infrastructure rate and
24	adjustment filing as requested by Dominion on an interim
25	basis with an effective date of January 1, 2024.

1	The purpose of this filing is for Dominion to
2	seek to modify the infrastructure rate adjustment tracker
3	to the distribution non-gas cost portion achieved on
4	natural gas rate schedules pursuant to section 2.07 percent
5	of its tariff.
6	The current proposal represents revenue
7	requirement increase of \$2.121 million. If approved the
8	typical GS customer would see an annual increase of \$1.21,
9	or 0.13 percent. This application complies with past
L O	Commission orders.
11	The Division recommends the Commission approve
12	the proposed rates order. The Division recommends the
13	Commission approve the proposed rates on an interim basis
L 4	until the Division can complete its audit review, at which
15	time it will make a final recommendation to the Commission
16	to include any prudently incurred costs in the
L 7	infrastructure rate adjustment tracker in general rates as
18	part of the next general rate case.
19	If all four dockets addressed in this hearing
20	today are approved, the typical GS customer using 70
21	decatherms per year would see an increase of \$19.92 a year,
22	or 2.06 percent.
23	This concludes my comments. Thank you.
24	MR. GRECU: The witness is available for cross
25	examination and questions from the hearing officer.

1	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. Any questions of
2	this witness by Dominion?
3	MS. CLARK: No, Dominion has no questions.
4	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Mr. Orton, I don't any
5	questions for you either. Thank you for appearing today.
6	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
7	HEARING OFFICER: Anything else with respect to
8	the dash 22 docket?
9	MS. CLARK: Nothing from the Company.
10	MR. GRECU: Nothing from the Division.
11	HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Then I believe that's
12	it. We've run through all four dockets and we're mindful
13	of the requested effective date of January 1, 2024. We
14	will issue appropriate orders in due course. If there is
15	nothing else we will be adjourned.
