## Summary

On August 01, 2025, Corix Utah City Heating and Cooling LLC, or Corix, filed with the Commission an application for a certificate of public convenience and necessity (CPCN) authorizing Corix to construct, own, and operate a heat corporation to offer heating and cooling services for the Utah City development in Vineyard, Utah.

Utah City is a high-density, mixed-use development, with Flagborough L.L.C. being the developer, and Corix's customer, who will own all the buildings in the development.

It is the Division's understanding that Corix qualifies as a public utility under the definitions listed in Utah Code subsections 54-2-1(24)(a) and 54-2-1(24)(b)(i). The Division has reviewed Corix's application for a CPCN and the applicable statutes and found that the Company has provided the necessary information to fulfill the statutory requirements to

obtain a CPCN. The Company proposes to produce and generate artificial heat to customers in a defined territory. If the Company's request is approved, Corix would be the first heat corporation in Utah regulated by the Commission. Future filings will be needed to establish rates before service begins.

In conclusion, the Division concludes that Corix has met the requirements for a CPCN and the public interest will be promoted by the Commission granting Corix a CPCN to construct, own, and operate a heat corporation providing heating and cooling services for the 350-acre Utah City development. The Division recommends that the Commission approve the application.
