5	I'm the Commission's designated presiding officer for
6	this hearing. With me are Commissioners David Clark and
7	Commissioner John Harvey.
8	This evening, tonight, is February 8th, 2024,
9	and it's approximately 5:30 p.m. This is the date and
10	time that was noticed for the members of the public to
11	come comment on the petition of Qwest Corporation DBA
12	CenturyLink QC for statewide exemption from carrier of
13	last resort obligations, Docket Number 23-049-01.
14	Why don't we take appearances quickly. For
15	the applicant?
16	MS. WAGNER: Katie Wagner for CenturyLink.
17	PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you.
18	For the Division?
19	MR. GRECU: Patrick Grecu, Assistant Attorney
20	General for the Division.
21	PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you.
22	Mr. Moore?
23	MR. MOORE: Robert Moore for the Office of
24	Consumer Services.
25	PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you.
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1	MS. SLAWSON: Kira Slawson for the Utah Rural
2	Telecom Association, intervenors.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you very
4	much. Well, at this point it doesn't appear that we
5	have anyone present. Does anyone know otherwise?
6	Ms. Anderson promised somebody might show up at 5:30.
7	MR. MOORE: She did, but she's out there
8	looking for them.
9	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Well, I'll tell you
10	what we'll do. So our notice indicated that we would
11	give anyone present by 5:30 a reasonable opportunity
12	to to comment. I think I'd like to provide a little
13	bit more time beyond 5:30. Usually we we do give
14	folks a little bit more time. So I think what makes
15	sense right now is to go into recess and come back at
16	5:50, unless we start getting a rush of folks. And our
17	staff will let us know if people show up. Okay?

22	PRESIDING OFFICER: Looks like everybody is
23	here. Okay. We have a guest, Ms. VanDame; is that

25	MS. VanDAME: VanDame.

1	PRESIDING OFFICER: VanDame. Okay. Good
2	evening. We just to give you some context, we had an
3	evidentiary hearing earlier today, and we heard from
4	witnesses under oath and accepted evidence, and so now
5	this is your opportunity to give some public comment on
6	your understanding of the docket. You have an
7	opportunity to give a comment under oath or not under
8	oath, if you
9	MS. VanDAME: Not oath.
10	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Please come sit
11	down at this seat here. And if you could pull the
12	microphone closer to you, it would be helpful so
13	everyone can hear you and the court reporter
14	MS. VanDAME: Okay.
15	PRESIDING OFFICER: will be able to
16	transcribe what you say.
17	MS. VanDAME: I'll try to remember to speak
18	loud enough.
19	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Why don't you state
20	your name.
21	KATHY VANDAME
22	a member of the public commented as follows:
23	MS. VanDAME: My name is Kathy VanDame. I'm
24	speaking as a citizen, and I wanted to speak about this
25	docket for actually two reasons.

1	I noticed that one of the reasons that it came
2	to the Commission was because these CenturyLink
3	doesn't want to be the carrier of last resort, and part
4	of their reasoning was that was that they weren't
5	getting any of the money that we were paying in our
6	bills. I do have a line item that is for carrier of
7	last resort, but I read in the initial filings that they
8	weren't or the initial filing that they weren't
9	getting any of that money for some reason, and that
10	seems unfair.
11	But the real but that's not that's your
12	business and not mine. Mine is I didn't want landlines
13	to go away. I have the feeling that as cell phones and
14	all that get more popular, that there's beginning to be
15	a winding down of the landlines that we've had for such
16	a long time, and I just wanted to say that I think it's
17	a really important backup infrastructure.
18	They I just recently had a cousin in
19	Florida their cell phone was out of business for
20	three days, but they never lost their dial tone to their
21	landline. The landlines continue to work when the power
22	is down. The cell phone towers go down if the power is
23	down for a long time.
24	One of the other reasons that I think that
25	they're an important piece of infrastructure that we

1 need to preserve is that the privacy protections on 2 landlines are different than on cell phones. The data 3 that is generated by using our cell phones are widely marketed. The police have access to that local --4 location information. Women that are -- people that are being harassed and trailed by ex-spouses and stuff can 6 have their information, but landlines you have to have a subpoena to get that information. 8 9 And on my landline, I have an answering 10 machine that's right in my home. That -- those messages 11 are never stored in the cloud. They go directly over the landline onto one of those old tapes, and it always 12 13 works the same. It -- never does anybody give me an 14 upgrade to that. I could go and buy a new one, but this 15 one has actual buttons that do the same thing every

Unlike my cell phone, where somebody's, you know, given me this wonderful present, you know, and we've all of us had the experience that every time they give you a new thing, there are some things that work better, but there's things that you used to use that don't work so well anymore.

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time.

So I just wanted to come and advocate strongly that these -- this is existing, unique -- that we would be very unwise to let it go away.

1	And, also, I'd like to complain about
2	CenturyLink. I don't know what happened, but after I
3	wrote the letter, I lost my dial tone. It took me about
4	six weeks to get it back, and, finally, the person that
5	fixed it that called me up and said she didn't know what
6	happened. She had called the office, and it was turned
7	off in the office. And that is paranoid thinking that I
8	had six weeks I couldn't get a dial tone after I wrote
9	my letter, but that's what happened.
10	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Thank you very much
11	for participating. You may step down.
12	MS. VanDAME: Thank you.
13	PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you.
14	MS. VanDAME: You haven't got any questions;
15	right?
16	PRESIDING OFFICER: No. Thank you.
17	Are we expecting so I got the list. So
18	we're assuming this is
19	MS. ANDERSON: This is it.
20	PRESIDING OFFICER: This is it. Okay. So I'm
21	relying heavily on this piece of paper to assume that
22	there really is nobody, at least that we're expecting.
23	MS. ANDERSON: Ms. Ashdown and Ms. VanDame
24	were the only ones that I was aware of that were
25	interested in this party.

1	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.
2	MS. ANDERSON: Ms. Ashdown is out of town.
3	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.
4	MS. ANDERSON: So she's unable to attend.
5	PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. Well, based on that
6	and based on that it is now about let's just be
7	honest here 5:47 and this was noticed at 5:30, we
8	will we will adjourn the public witness component of
9	this docket. Thank you again for being here. Have a
10	good night.
